Home & Co. returned Saturday at noon from the east where he has been on a few weeks business trip. Mr. Hilson was caught in the three recent big storms, being at Montague during the first, at Bear River during the second and at Morell in the third. He intended to return to Charlottetown on Tuesday last but the storm prevented him. On Friday evening he drove to Mount Stewart over almost impassible roads from Morell and came to the city by the Georgetown train on Saturday.

Suddenly of heart failure at Murray Harbor North, Matilda McClure Graham, the beloved wife of David Sencaubagh departed this life on the 17th January in the 28th year of her age. The deceased was of a cheerful disposition; seldom did anyone hear her complain, although for the past two years she had been in very delicate health; her household duties too were always attended to and never neglected. She leaves a disconsolate husband, an infant daughter five weeks old, also three brothers and two sisters besides a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother, a kind sister and obliging friend.

"Does education exercise greater influence for good than wealth?" was the subject for discussion at the C. B. C. Debating Society meeting on Saturday evening. The affirmative was opened by L. Jos Read, Dr. Warburton, Mr. McWilliams, Mr. Smith, Mr. Irving, Mr. Bowen, Mr. Clarke, Mr. Agnew, Mr. McMillan, Mr. Arsenault and Mr. McInnis in front of Messrs Richards and Read and Dr. Douglas adjoining the seat of the clerk. The Opposition will as usual occupy the side to the right of the Speaker and with range from the Leader Mr. Mathieson thus: Mr. McDonald, Mr. Morson, Mr. McKinnon, Mr. Prowse, Mr. Kieckham, Mr. Fraser, Mr. Wood. The Assembly Chamber has been thoroughly renovated and is now all ready for the opening to-morrow afternoon.

It is hard for any one who has not been over the Island railway during the past week or two to conceive of the great difficulty experienced in opening a way for trains. Many places for hundreds of yards the track is just a narrow passage the width of the snow plough cut through the snow, and this fills in with the slightest drift. The Guardian representative on Saturday had the privilege of seeing Egan's cutting, a few hundred yards to the east of Mount Stewart, which is pronounced the biggest on the eastern line. No one who has not been on the spot can fully realize the work necessary to make a way through the bank. At Loyalist the cutting extends some hundred yards and is almost all the way over the tops of the cars. The snow is packed hard and the engines soon stick thus making shovel work necessary and greatly increasing the labor from what it would be if the snow were light.

In the storm of Saturday which was the equal of any during the winter the remains of the late Vernon Lowe were laid to rest in the People's Cemetery. Notwithstanding that the day was bitterly cold and a blinding snow was drifting there was a very large attendance and many accompanied the body to the grave. There was a very large representation from the Fourth Regiment and the Light Horse and the firing party was selected from No. 2 Co. C. A. of which the deceased was Sergeant. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. J. Woodroffe and the pall-bearers were Benj. Rogers jr., Jos. Darke, J. Wonnacott, Edward McKie, J. Albert Watkins and Ernest Foster. When at the house of Caretaker Gregory the hearse had to be discarded owing to the immense snowbanks and the casket was placed on a sleigh and hauled by those in attendance over hedges and fences to the place of interment. Returning to the city in the face of the storm it was almost impossible to keep the road and horses were sometimes almost completely swallowed up in the snowbanks.
