### THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)  
**MONTREAL**, Que., Apr. 1.—Potatoes: egg and butter prices advanced while cheese quotations were unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today.  
New Brunswick green mountain potatoes, in carlots, gained 5 to 7 1-2 cents a pound being quoted at 90 to 92 1-2 cents per eighty pound bag. To retailers prices were unchanged at \$1.00 per eighty pound bag.  
The only change on the egg market was the prices of fresh seconds to retailers, up one cent at 23 cents a dozen. Ontario and prairie fresh extras, in carlots, were quoted at 24 to 24 1-2 cents, firsts at 22 to 22 1-2 cents, and seconds at 18 cents a dozen. Fresh British Columbia extras, in carlots, were quoted at 25 cents, firsts at 24 cents, pullets at 22 cents and seconds at 20 cents a dozen. Receipts were 3,568 cases.  
Prices of solids and prints to retailers advanced one cent a pound on the butter market being quoted at 34 and 35 cents a pound respectively. Regraded eastern townships and fresh western number one butter was quoted unchanged at 32 1-4 to 32 1-2 cents a pound. Receipts were 210 boxes.  
On the cheese market winter colored was unchanged at 13 1-2 to 13 3-4 cents a pound and receipts were seventeen boxes.  
**OTTAWA**, Ont., Apr. 1.—Canadian egg markets do not show any change of importance today. Prices are generally unchanged with eastern buyers still not showing much interest in western eggs at asking prices.  
**TORONTO**—This egg market is unchanged. Sales of graded Ontario shipments are being made to wholesalers at extras 23 cents; firsts 21 cents, seconds 18 1-2 cents delivered. Dealers are quoting producers and country shippers for eggs extras 10 to 20 cents, firsts 17 to 18 cents, seconds 15 cents, delivered, cases returned.

**MONTREAL—Egg receipts** here today were 3,568 cases as compared to 3,449 cases for the corresponding day last year. The market is steady. Seconds are scarce and wholesale dealers are paying for them 19 to 20 cents. Western eggs are being offered at extras 24 cents, firsts 23, seconds 19 cents, but buyers here are not much interested at these prices.

## Mr. McLure Asks

### Co-operation Of Fed'l Government

The following extract from the Hansard reports of Parliament for March 26th, speaks for itself:  
On the orders of the day:  
Mr. W. C. S. McClure (Queens): I should like to direct the attention of the Minister of Railways and Canals (Mr. Manion) to the ice conditions now prevailing in Northumberland Strait, which have caused serious trouble with reference to shipments of freight to and from Prince Edward Island. At the present time over 1,100 cars of freight are held up because of these ice conditions. I should like to know what action the Department of Railways has taken to relieve this condition.

Hon. R. J. Manion (Minister of Railways and Canals): The hon. member who has just spoken, and other hon. members from Prince Edward Island, have brought this matter to my attention for the past two or three days, and I have been taking it up with the officials of the Canadian National Railways, who handle the ferry business between the island and the mainland. Up to this morning it was the opinion of those whose views were authoritative in regard to the matter that nothing could be done. It was considered a question of the elements, and it was thought that only a favourable wind could sweep the ice out. This morning, however, the hon. member who has just spoken showed me a telegram from the same organization, I believe it was the Potato Dealers' Association of Prince Edward Island, asking the Department of Marine to supply an icebreaker on the condition that the association would provide a steamer to handle the potatoes. We have taken up this matter with the Department of Marine, and the minister has agreed to have the icebreaker which is now in Nova Scotia, sent to Prince Edward Island at the beginning of the week, as was requested in the telegram. We will be only too glad to do anything possible in this and every other way to relieve such conditions.

**INDIANAPOLIS**, Ind., April 1.—A new scientific "breath-smeller" is ready for use by the police, enforcement officers and suspicious spouses. It registers any degree of drunkenness, merely by catching some of the drinkers' breath and is so sensitive that it detects alcohol even when all odor is expurgated from the breath.  
A description of the apparatus was made public today by the American Chemical Society at whose meeting here it will be demonstrated this week in the act of trapping alcoholic breath. It was perfected by Dr. R. N. Harper of the Medical School of the University of Indiana.

The suspected breath is blown into a toy balloon. From there it is bubbled through liquid, which speedily turns almost white if there is alcohol.  
Should the drinker object to blowing balloons, it is only necessary to hold a small glass suction tube within an inch or two of his nose or mouth. Even if the tube sucks in 10 times as much outside air as exhalation, the bubbler still works accurately.

Dr. Hagger said that need for testing drunken drivers of automobiles was responsible for producing the breath smeller. He credited Emil Bogen, M. D. of Cincinnati with starting the breath indexing methods.

**JOB MEANS 72 MILE HIKE**  
**VANCOUVER**, Wash., March 31.—D. P. Faubion and M. C. Boyer, geologist, have a job. But to get to it, they had to hike 72 miles—half of it on snowshoes. They were employed by the federal geological survey to collect data on water flow at the head of the Lewis river.

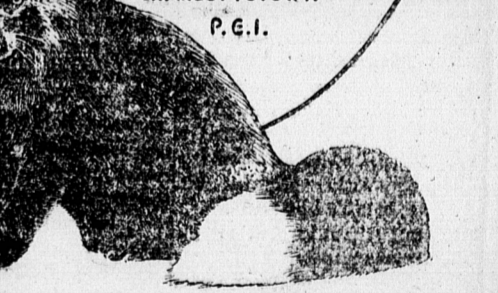
