Provide A Job Campaign Planned

HALIFAX, Feb. 15 (CP) - Provide a job campaign - a national drive to find temporary work during the re-ignition of the unemployment season - will open in the Maritimes Feb. 27 and continue for two weeks. Union men say there are nearly 40,000 jobless in the Maritimes. The campaign aims at placing unemployed men in temporary jobs to provide some relief until construction projects start in the spring. Last year some 600 persons found such part-time jobs. Every person, particularly the householder, in the Maritimes is asked to assist by having small jobs around their establishments done now while the unemployment situation is at its peak. The drive is sponsored by the regional employment committees in co-operation with the National Employment Service.

Strike-Bound Hotel Returns To Normal

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Feb. 15 (CP) - Life in the fashionable Myrtle Bank Hotel here returned to normal today when 210 workers called off a brief but bitter strike after a six-hour conference between union officials and the hotel management. Both parties agreed that dispute be placed before an arbitration board. The board will conduct a hearing to determine whether the Trades Union Council or the Bustamante Industrial Trades Union will be bargaining agent for the hotel employees. The 26-hour strike had a political tinge. William Bustamante, leader of the business-backed Labor Party, is virtual prime minister of Jamaica. The Trades Union Council is supported by the People's National (Socialist) Party, the Opposition Party. Police used tear gas last night to disperse pickets when they ignored a police order to reduce their ranks. Three persons, two policemen and a union official - were slightly injured.

GENTLEMAN BANDIT

PARIS, Feb. 14 (AP) - A "gentleman" bandit, arrested for looting a series of Paris homes, was identified by police today as an escaped convict under sentence of death for murder. Police identified the prisoner as Paul Dellapina, 39-year-old Corsican, convicted for the murder of a Norwegian consul at Marseille four years ago. Police said after they picked up Dellapina they found jewels worth 10,000,000 francs (\$28,000) in his apartment.

SUPREME COURT

Three appeals by Donald G. Campbell from convictions by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin were dismissed yesterday by Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy. Sentences confirmed. Sentences were 30 days in jail for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated; three months in jail, and prohibited from driving in Canada for one year, also for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated; and six months in jail for operating a motor vehicle while his license was suspended. Costs were awarded the Crown in the first two appeals. Mr. J. P. Nicholson acted for the Crown in the three appeals while Mr. J. R. MacMillan and Mr. Henry J. Murphy, Moncton, of the New Brunswick bar, represented the appellant in the three cases. Mr. MacMillan introduced Mr. Murphy in court and Mr. Justice Tweedy welcomed the visiting barrister, as did Mr. Nicholson.

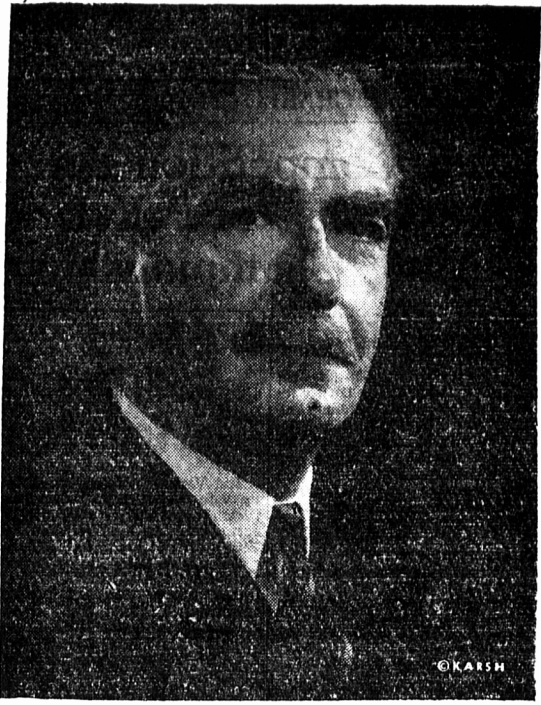
BLAME HOODLUMS

We were dropping at 300 feet a minute. Fire in No. 5 started shortly after and then No. 3 stopped with a plugged gas line."

Empire Free Trade Is Urged By Beaverbrook

By NORMAN CRIBBENS LONDON, Feb. 15 (CP) - The outspoken Beaverbrook press is again hammering home the theme of Empire free trade in Britain's general election campaign and has promised to support any candidate who will get behind such a policy.

Canadian-born Lord Beaverbrook, fiery publisher of three big London papers - the Daily Express, the Evening Standard and the Sunday Express - is back in Britain for the Feb. 23 election. He has predicted that Winston Churchill will carry the Conservative Party to victory.

But though he and his newspapers are predominantly Conservative, Beaverbrook has never toed the party line and on numerous occasions has clashed violently with the official Conservative union with British colonies and an extension of Imperial preference "to make trade flow freely within the Commonwealth."

It calls for "an Empire citizenship with the whole Empire as a homeland for all its sons, wherever they may go within it."

New Process For Making Steel Reported

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE NEW YORK, Feb. 15 (AP) - A new process makes high-quality steel in 12 minutes without using fuel, two scientists reported today.

The steel is equal in quality to open-hearth steel, they said. But it takes eight to 12 hours to make a batch of open-hearth steel, cooking it in a fire of fuel oil, or some form of gas.

The new method is called the turbo-hearth, shaped like a giant steel coffee-maker. Molten pig iron from the blast furnace is poured in. Blasts of air are shot in from the side, to blow over the molten iron.

The pig iron cooks itself to homogeneous steel. Carbon and other impurities in the pig iron supply the heat as they burn or oxidize in the air stream.

The turbo-hearth was described to the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers by C. E. Sims, assistant director of Battelle Memorial Institute, Columbus, Ohio, and F. L. Toy of Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation, largest subsidiary of United States Steel Corporation.

A 30-ton turbo-hearth could make at least 60 tons of steel an hour, or 480 tons an eight-hour day, they said. This would be double or triple the production in a working day from a 150- or 225-ton open-hearth.

The turbo-hearth is easier to build. Steel production could be fitted flexibly to demands. More hearths could be used when demand was high, fewer when demand fell off.

Such advantages, plus savings in fuel, might reduce costs of some steels. A 30-ton turbo hearth has been tested commercially at South Chicago, or 480 tons an eight-hour day, they said. This would be double or triple the production in a working day from a 150- or 225-ton open-hearth.

The steel was cast into ingots and rolled into plates. Tests showed it equal to open-hearth steel of the same composition in tensile strength, bending, strain aging, and impact.
