**MOIRE RIBBON MAKES SMART TRIMMING FOR CREPE COMBINATION**

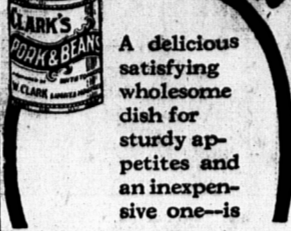

**Rhodes Scholarship For Mr. Robt. Messervey, B.A.**

Mr. Robert Messervey, B. A., youngest son of Mr. John A. Messervey, M. P., for Queen's has been awarded a special Rhodes Scholarship for two years at Oxford by the Rhodes Trust in London.

Mr. Messervey's college career has been exceedingly brilliant. He graduated from the University of Toronto in June 4th, taking the degree of Bachelor of Arts, with honours in all subjects.

Mr. Messervey is as well known in his musical ability as a vocalist as well as for his success in his college career.

In 1924 the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto he was the winner of the Grand Prize for the Canadian Competition in Singing. There were 147 competitors, and each had to perform before 32 of the leading musical authorities of Canada.

Thus, it will be seen that this was a tremendous honour and not able event in the life of Mr. Messervey.

In addition to the award of the Rhodes Scholarship, Mr. Messervey has also received a very tempting offer to go to New York and take up concert work in that city.

### Departure Of Rev. D. MacVicar For N.S.

Yesterday afternoon Rev. Mr. and Mrs. D. MacVicar left by the S. S. Hochelaga en route for Thorburn, N. S. where Mr. MacVicar will be inducted as the new minister on Wednesday. Mr. MacVicar has been minister of Cardigan for nine and a half years, and in addition has been moderator of the Presbytery of P. E. I. He has done a great deal of Presbyterial work through the island, and has organized several minority churches which had been left without ministers or property as the result of the disruptions.

On Sunday Mr. MacVicar preached farewell sermons at both Cardigan and Montague where there were crowded congregations. At Montague after the evening service, Mr. MacVicar was welcomed up by a representative of the congregation and was presented with a purse of money as a parting gift. Mr. MacVicar acknowledged the presentation and, asked that his thanks and appreciation be conveyed to the members who had so generously contributed to it.

From a lucrative standpoint this is far more advantageous than the sale of hogs. Common grass cattle were not wanted and the traders were predicting much lower prices on that kind of stock. A straight load of good steers was sold for 8.00 and two or three smaller lots bought 8.25 and 8.50. The bulk of the steers would be sold between 6.00 and 7.25. Good cows were weighed up at 5.50 to 6.00 with a few of the best 6.25. Common bulls were moving very slowly as prices ranging mostly from 4.00 to 4.75. Quotations: Butcher steers, good 8.00 to 8.25; Medium 3.75 to 7.50, common 6.00 to 6.75; butcher heifers, 7.00 to 7.50, medium 6.00 to 6.50, 5.00 to 5.50, good 5.50 to 6.25; medium 3.50 to 5.00; canners 2.00 to 2.50; cutters 2.75 to 3.25; butcher bulls, common 3.50 to 4.75. 'Half receipts, 2.975. Good calves were in keen demand and the few offered sold steady to strong. Fairly good veals bought 8.00 and 8.50, good ones 9.00. And a few of the best were picked out at 9.25 and 1.50. Heavy pig fed calves ranged from 6.00 to 7.50, according to quality. Grassers and very thin finishers were lower and bought from 5.00 to 5.50. Quotations: good 8.50 to 8.50, medium 8.00 to 8.25; common 6.50 to 7.50, grass 5.00 to 5.50. Sheep receipts 784. Lambs sold steady at 15 c. to 17 1/2 c. per bulk. Bulk of sheep were of poor quality and sold from 6.00 to 6.00 with very few selling up to 7.00. Quotations: ewes 4.00 to
