Quakes Subside In Cen. America

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 13 (A.P.) - The people in Chile and Argentina, which has been darkened for two days by a heavy rain of ashes from border volcanoes, breathed easier today as the sun peeked feebly from the clouds. Likewise earthquakes had subsided, with only occasional rumbling noted and seismologists said the danger of violent eruptions or earthquakes apparently was over for the time being.

The volcanic area on the Chilean Argentine border began intense disturbances during the week end, which continued through Sunday and Monday, and forced many cities to resort to artificial light because of the heavy fall of ashes.

The Chilean and Argentine countryside were terrorized by quakes and thousands went without sleep for the constant fear of a death dealing upheaval of the earth.

DeValera Sets Out to Punish Ireland's Farmers

DUBLIN, April 13 - With the reluctant approval of his cabinet, President Eamon de Valera took steps today to punish Irish farmers who have refused to pay the land annuities into the Irish treasury.

De Valera's retention of the land annuities from the British treasury had an unlooked for effect. Numerous landowners promptly took advantage of the president's policy and withheld their share of the annuities from Ireland.

The annuities represent reimbursement to the British treasury for funds expended for the purchase of land which was then turned over to Irish farmers under an agreement between Ireland and Britain for the development of Irish agriculture.

Patrick J. Ruttledge, minister for lands and fisheries, resorted to an indirect method of punishment for delinquent farmers. He notified the various county councils that their pro rata share of the government's annual 2,000,000 pound (\$8,000,000) agricultural grants had been reduced by the amount of unpaid annuities in their districts. The slash was made from the grants for the quarter ending March 31.

This means the finances of the various counties will be seriously disarranged, and the bulk of the farmers will have to suffer for the delinquencies of a comparative few. The government hopes innocent sufferers will bring pressure to bear and force the others to pay up.

The next installment of the annuities falls due in June. It amounts to 1,500,000 pounds (\$6,000,000) and payments are already in arrears to the tune of 500,000 pounds (\$2,000,000).

If necessary, the government will resort to the due processes of law on a gigantic scale and will not hesitate to evict and confiscate the property of delinquents.

Col. Price Sounds Radio Warning

TORONTO, Ont., April 13 - (By the Canadian Press) - Col. W. H. Price, Ontario Attorney-General, tonight called for protection against dissemination in Canada of United States thought and ideas through motion pictures and radio. He was addressing a local Orange lodge.

Assailing spreads of ideas from across the International border through these Media, Col. Price said the situation was a serious one. Canadian people, he declared, must be roused to a realization of the peril confronting British ideals from "this insidious propaganda."

The Attorney-General said he was not in favor of Dominion ownership of radio but added some form of control must be devised.

PREMIER AND OPPOSITION LEADER SUE

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., April 13 (By the Canadian Press) - The full bench of Newfoundland's Supreme Court has decided that it has full jurisdiction to hear suits brought by W. L. Emerson against Premier Sir Richard Squires and Hon. Dr. Alexander Campbell. The opposition member of the Legislature, suing as a private citizen, seeks to recover penalties on the ground the Ministers had accepted emoluments from the Crown apart from their seasonal indemnity and ministerial salary.

H. A. Winter, K. C., counsel for Mr. Emerson will move trial in a day or two.

The Emerson suit, asking \$10,000 from Sir Richard and \$7,000 from Dr. Campbell were brought some weeks ago under a statute which vacates the seat of a member accepting such emoluments, and provides that \$200 may be recovered by any individual suing, for each time the member affected sits or votes.

Sir Richard's motion that no grounds for action existed was not sustained at the first hearing, and his appeal was dismissed by the full bench today.

The Court also affirmed its jurisdiction to hear for penalties a matter that was already before a committee of the House of Assembly. Dr. Campbell had disputed such authority yesterday.

The Emerson suits declared Sir Richard had accepted \$5,000 as reparations commissioner, and that Dr. Campbell had been paid \$1800 a year as a physician at the General Hospital, as well as holding other government positions.

Irish Free State True to Flag

ENNISKILLEN, Northern Ireland APRIL, 13 - (A.P.) - Viscount Craigavon, Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, told a Unionist meeting tonight that whatever happened in the controversy between Great Britain and the Irish Free State, nothing would make his government "flinch in upholding the flag which so long has flown over Ulster, the United Kingdom and the rest of the Empire."

A resolution expressing unshakable loyalty to the King and a determination at all cost to remain within Great Britain and the empire was adopted by the meeting. (The Unionist party is the Government party in Ulster.)

Northern Ireland is represented in the British House of Commons by 13 members, but maintains a parliament of her own comprising a House of Commons of 52 elected members and a Senate of 26 members, two of them ex-officio and 24 elected by members of the House of Commons on the proportional representation system.

The population of the Irish Free State at the same time was 2,971,992.
