Royal Bank Of Canada Will Purchase Quebec Bank

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.—It is officially announced that the Royal Bank of Canada will purchase the Quebec Bank.

The directors of the banks have reached an agreement whereby for every three shares of Quebec Bank stock shareholders of the Quebec Bank will receive one share of Royal Bank stock and \$75 in cash.

A circular has been dispatched to the shareholders of the Quebec Bank calling a special meeting to ratify the agreement. In this circular the directors of the Quebec Bank state that after a persistent and vigorous effort to establish the bank in the west and to increase its business elsewhere they have concluded that it is in the interests of the shareholders to amalgamate with a larger and stronger bank. The Royal Bank of Canada is one of the strongest of the Canadian banks. On August 31st, its deposits exceeded \$190,000,000, and the purchase of the Quebec Bank will further strengthen it. Three directors of the Quebec Bank will be added to the board of the Royal Bank of Canada. The Minister of Finance has given his official consent to the merger.

A Letter From England

Mr. R. K. Brace, City, is in receipt of the following interesting letter from Pte. Harry L. Currie, of Charlottetown, with the 40th Battalion reserve, at Folkestone, England:

Dear Sir—Received a letter from you some time ago, and was pleased to hear from you. This is indeed a cruel war. I suppose you saw where George Crossman got killed,—the painter's son, I think. Well, I was talking to an officer that came over from France. He was in the 26th Battalion, and knew John McLean. He told me he felt awfully sorry about him. He said Jack was a fine fellow, and he liked him awfully well. He said Jack was cooking for him for a while. I have not been to France yet. I thought I was going in a draft some time ago, but instead they sent me away to take a cooking course. Well, I did not finish the course and when I came back nearly all of the 55th had gone over to France, so I was transferred to the 40th Battalion. I can't tell the day now when I will be in France.

I was over to Diggate Camp and saw quite a number of the 16th Battalion. I did not see those fellows you spoke of. I hope this war will soon be over, for I am longing to see those at home. I expect there will be a lot of fighting before the Hun is beaten. I know that we cannot all come back. Some will be left on the battlefield,—perhaps myself for one, but I must only trust to God above to bring me back safe. It will be a sorrowful time for some and gladness for others when it is over,—some coming and some never to return. Do you know, R. K., that to my mind P. E. Island is the most civilized place on earth, after what I have seen since I came to this

country. If our people at home did what I have seen done here, especially on Sundays, they would be arrested. I am not a religious man myself, though I would like to be,—NOT because I see death staring me in the face most any day now, but since coming here I feel more inclined to see things in a better light. It is nothing else but the sin of this world which has brought on this war, and if the war was stopped tomorrow the people would go on just the same. (You would think to hear me talk I was a converted man, but this is not how I feel about it now.) I would like to go home and hear Rev. Mr. McLean preach. I have heard preaching here but I think Mr. McLean is the best speaker I ever heard, and I hope to hear him again before very long.

I have not much news to tell in camp. There is nothing to see, and no one believes we have never been inside a theater or picture house since I came to this country. I don't know why it is, but I don't seem to want to go. You see a great many women, children and soldiers going and coming from these places.

There are quite a number of the 55th Battalion back from the front wounded. Billy Kelly got shot through the spine. He is in the Imperial Hospital, London. Perhaps you know him. He belongs up west of Summerside, and belongs to the Orange Order. I often read the little Bible you gave me. A lady here has given me another, so I ought to make good use of them. Remember me to Rev. Mr. McLean, for it was through him I got those socks.

I will now close. Write soon.
