—HALF-HOLIDAY.—Wednesday afternoon being the first half-holiday of the season, all the principal stores of Summerside were closed. Although the weather was threatening a large number of citizens left for the country, where they spent a pleasant afternoon's outing.—H.

—HEAVY FREIGHT.—The Northumberland docked at Summerside at 8:40 Wednesday evening with about 75 passengers; also, one car lime, one car autos, and four cars way freight. Thursday morning's outward freight consisted of two cars eggs, two cars lobsters, two cars fish and two cars way freight.—H.

—SERIOUSLY ILL.—Mr. Joseph Peters, Bloomfield, crossed by the boat Wednesday morning en route to Halifax, he having received a telegram informing him that his son, Pte. —BUILDING IN O'LEARY.—Those are "boom" days in O'Leary. The salespeople in the different stores are kept busy waiting on customers. Many men are employed on the new extension to Kennedy Co.'s store, which will make the already large building one hundred and sixty-five feet in length, with a cement foundation for the entire length of the building. A novel institution about the cement work is a barrel mixer, placed on small wheels embedded in a frame, which are set in motion by a gas engine. —ONE OF FOUR BROTHERS AT FRONT IS KILLED.—A T. J. Myers, Esplanade, was killed by a shell on Thursday. The other three brothers, Lance, Corporal George E. Myers who had been previously wounded, had only been in action six weeks when he was killed. Mrs. Myers, who is a widow, has given four cents to her country, one of whom has made the supreme sacrifice. The others are Napoleon Myers, and John Myers with the 40th Battalion, and Gunner Fred Myers with the 17th, now the 6th battery, who has been twice wounded. Mrs. Myers' only boy, to have been hit in the war. Besides his mother and three brothers, Lance, Corporal Myers is survived by four sisters including Frances, a little girl at home; Mrs. John Greenwell, Sydney; Mrs. Mahoney and Miss Eliza of New York and by two brothers, aged fifteen and twelve respectively, at home.

—NORTH CARLETON SCHOOL.—The semi-annual examination of the North Carleton School was held on Thursday afternoon, June 28th, and was attended by a large number of ratepayers and visitors. The school room was nicely decorated with flowers for the occasion. The pupils were examined by their teacher, Miss Bell, assisted by Mrs. Harry Lowther. 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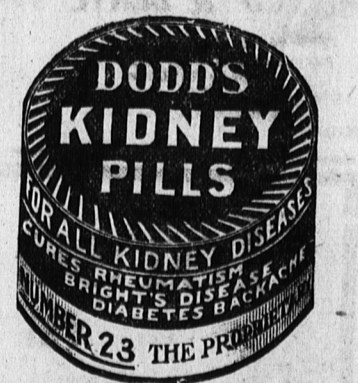
—Mr. Owen Larkin, Summerside, left on Monday evening on a business trip to Middleton.—H.
