

Meeting Of The Presbytery

Held at St. James' Hall on the 5th Inst - Resignation of Rev. A. Craise - Call to Rev. M. J. McPherson

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there on Tuesday, March 5th, 1907, at 2:30 o'clock p. m. which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in quarterly session and was constituted by the moderator, Mr. John Murray, with whom were present Messrs A. S. Stewart, W. H. Spencer, T. F. Fullerton, Geo. Miller, A. Craise, R. G. Sinclair, E. J. Rattee, W. A. Mason, E. Smith, A. D. Stirling, R. G. Sinclair, W. A. McKay, M. H. McIntosh, G. E. Ross, ministers, Daniel McDonald, T. C. James, A. N. McLeod, D. J. Campbell, Angus McPherson, L. McInnis, D. N. Forbes, and James Carruthers, elders. Minutes of meetings on Nov. 11th, 17th, 27th, Dec. 13th, 1906 Jan 2d 15th and 22d, 1907 were read and approved. Mr. A. S. Stewart was elected moderator for the ensuing six months. Mr. A. Craise was re-elected clerk for one year. On motion the following were appointed commissioners to the General Assembly, which meets in Montreal on June 5th, by rotation: Messrs John Murray and W. A. Mason, ministers; by election: Messrs M. H. McIntosh and R. G. Sinclair, ministers, and T. C. James, Ch' town, James Carruthers, Bedouque, J. J. McLeod, Riversdale, and D. N. Forbes, Tyne Valley, elders. Took up resignation of Mr. R. G. Sinclair. Mr. Sinclair stated that he had decided to withdraw his resignation. Presbytery cheerfully acquiesced. The resignation of Mr. A. Craise of the pastoral charge of St. Peter's and W. St. Peter's was read. The clerk stated that he had called the session and congregation to appear at this meeting. On motion the action of the clerk was sustained. Mr. Angus McPherson represented the session and congregation. It was moved by Mr. T. F. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. R. G. Sinclair, and carried that the resignation be accepted. Mr. G. Miller, seconded by Mr. G. E. Ross, was appointed interim moderator of the session of Mr. Stewart and W. St. Peter's. Mr. Stewart was instructed to declare the pulpit vacant as soon as possible after the 15th instant. Mr. T. F. Fullerton for the Home Mission committee reported that West River congregation asked that Mr. A. Craise be appointed ordained missionary and moved that he be appointed accordingly, also that he be appointed Prebendary Chaplain to the P. E. I. Hospital. This was seconded by Mr. W. A. Mason and agreed to. On motion it was decided to apply to the Home Mission Board in behalf of West River for a grant of \$25.00. With reference to Mr. Craise's appointment it was agreed to hold a designation service at West River, on Thursday, March 14th, 1907, at 9:30 o'clock p. m. Mr. W. H. Spencer was designated minister and Mr. E. Smith, elder. Presbytery discussed the minutes of the Home Mission Committee in regard to the supply of vacant congregations. Whereupon it was decided that the clerk be instructed to forward a list of vacancies to the agent at Halifax. Mr. W. A. Mason intimated that he moderated the call at Tyne Valley on the 25th day of January, 1907, and the call came out in favour of Mr. J. J. McPherson of the Home Mission. It was signed by 14 communicants and 110 adherents and accompanied by a guarantee of \$750 stipend with use of manse and stable. On motion the clerk read the report of the moderator was approved. Messrs James Ramsay spoke in support of the call which, on motion was sustained as a regular proposal and the clerk was instructed to forward the same to the clerk of the Presbytery of Miramichi. Presbytery agreed, should the call be accepted, to apply to the augmentation committee for a grant of \$50 for one year. Mr. J. M. McLeod was appointed to represent the Presbytery and the congregation calling before the Presbytery of Miramichi in prosecuting the call. Permission was given to the clerk and to Mr. W. H. Spencer to forward stationery to the convener of Assembly's committee on stationery. Mr. R. G. Sinclair read the report on Sabbath Schools. It was moved, seconded and carried that the report be adopted and the convener thanked for his diligence. The following recommendations were adopted: 1. That Presbytery express gratitute for the measure of efficiency maintained by our Sabbath Schools during the year as evidenced by the returns. 2. That ministers be enjoined to seek the cooperation of parents in the prosecution of the work of our Sabbath Schools. 3. That the attention of schools be drawn to the importance of teacher training classes, with the hope that where practicable such classes be established for the older scholars. 4. That a summer school for teachers and workers be conducted at Summerside during the summer, and that a committee be appointed to cooperate with Synod's committee in arranging for such school, this committee to have full power to make all arrangements, with power to add to their number, to arrange for summer schools.
