ISLANDER PASSES AWAY—A despatch dated Haverhill, Mass., Sept. 3rd, was received yesterday stating that Wm. Murley, wealthy hat manufacturer, died today. A brother Richard and a sister Lillian Ritchie reside in Charlottetown. The William Murley referred to above is a brother of Richard Murley of Murray Harbor and of Mrs. J. A. Ritchie, Upper Hillsboro street, this city. The deceased, who was in his 84th year, has resided in Haverhill for the past sixty years, leaving a wife and a widow and four children, three daughters and one son.

CITY SCHOOLS REOPEN—The city schools reopened yesterday with a large enrollment of new pupils, not so large as that of last year, however. To date Prince Street has about 500 enrolled, of which 54 are new pupils. West Kent with an enrollment of 412 has 24 additional pupils. Queen Square has about 810 enrolled and Rochford Square 412, with respectively 33 and 34 new pupils. Three of last year's teachers have resigned. In Prince Street Miss Lois Owen has been replaced by Miss Mary Rogers, who was transferred from West Kent. In the latter school Miss Ruth Ayers was replaced by Miss Gladys Taylor, and Mr. James Fullerton by Mr. C. F. Hine. Miss Mable Matheson has been appointed supernumerary teacher for Prince Street and West Kent, and Miss Marion McDonald for Queen Square and Rochford Square. Considerable repair work has been done during the summer months in the various schools. The most important renovation is the new lavatory for boys in Prince Street.

BISHOP O'LEARY'S ILLNESS—There is widespread anxiety over the condition of the health of His Lordship Bishop O'Leary who has been in the Charlottetown Hospital for the past few weeks. His brothers Messrs Richard and Arthur, Richibucto and his sister Mrs. McInerney, Saint John, are at present visiting him.

DOING NICELY—The Guardian learns with much pleasure that Right Rev. Monsignor Maurice McDonald and Rev. A. J. McIntyre, victims of last summer's distressing railway crossing accident are now well on the way to a complete recovery. Monsignor McDonald, who is undergoing treatment in Quebec, expects to return to Charlottetown some time late this fall.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT—Mr. John Thomas, of Lower Tryon, was very seriously injured on Sunday night when he was driving home with Mr. Joseph Francis, in the latter's buggy about 10 o'clock. While going over the bridge at Lower Tryon he was thrown out of the buggy and received very serious injuries to his spine besides minor cuts and bruises. He was picked up unconscious and taken to his home, where he did not regain consciousness for some considerable time. His wife, who was away from home at the time visiting in Summerside, and the western part of the Province, was sent for on Monday but at latest reports his condition was somewhat improved.

FATAL ACCIDENT—A deplorable accident occurred on Friday night about half past eight at Vernon. Thos. J. Furness, a well known resident of that place, while walking along the road near his home, was struck by an auto, driven by Mr. Milton Furness. There is a turn in the road and a thick bush at that point and the driver of the car did not see Mr. Furness in time to avert the accident. He was very severely injured, one of his legs being broken and he was at once taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where he lingered until Sunday night, when he passed away. Mr. Furness was 74 years of age, was a well known farmer and formerly a Customs Inspector at the port of Vernon River. He was a man of excellent character and had a very wide circle of friends, who will learn with deep regret of his passing. He leaves to mourn two sons, Wilfred Furness of Vernon and George Furness of the Bell Telephone Co., Toronto and a daughter Mrs. Albert Drake of Vernon. To the bereaved relatives deepest sympathy will be extended. The funeral will be held on Thursday.

The citizens of Summerside were shocked on Monday to hear of the death of Mr. Ernest Clark, one of the most popular young men of the town, at 4 a. m. that morning. On Sunday afternoon a party of young men and women had driven in cars to French River beach to spend the afternoon. Mr. Clark arrived after the others and was walking round exchanging greetings with the company and in doing so he went too near the edge of the cliff which crumbled and gave way, hurling him over the bank, which was forty feet at that spot onto the rocks below. Two young ladies who were walking with him only saved themselves by clutching the grass. The accident happened so quickly that it was impossible to save him. Some of the men immediately went for a doctor and Dr. Keir, of Malpeque and Dr. Fleming of Stanley Bridge arrived on the spot almost at once. They found Mr. Clark with a very bad scalp wound and terribly mutilated. He was taken to the house of Mr. McLeod near by and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Clark, were sent for but their son did not recover consciousness and passed away just about ten hours after the accident occurred. His brother Charles, was one of the party and his parents had been down at the place but had left early to make a call. Everything possible was done, but the skull was so badly fractured that it was marvelous that he was not instantly killed. Mr. Clark was 27 years of age and universally liked and worked at the Garden City Ranch near Summerside. The deepest sympathy is expressed for the bereaved parents, his brothers, Charles and Edward, and his sister, Mrs. L. M. Moore, all of Summerside. The body which was taken to the undertaker, Mr. Roy Phillips, at Kensington, was brought to his home in Summerside in the afternoon. The funeral was held on Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. from the home to the People's Cemetery at Summerside. Rev. J. P. C. Fraser conducted the services, assisted by Rev. Mr. Nicholson of Bequete. The large number of people of all ages who attended testified to the deep sympathy expressed and the high esteem in which the unfortunate victim was held.

This test, the second one, shows a much smaller percentage of infected cattle than the first. Of the 97000 cattle on P. E. I. 141 animals about one-sixth of one per cent, reacted to the test. Electoral district No. 1 Kings was the only one entirely without reactors. The co-operation everywhere has been one hundred per cent, a proof of the satisfactory nature of the first test.
