STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act, all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded, and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour, description and Registration Number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled, or inspected or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the above mentioned Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Nova Scotia ones and part twos brought from \$14.50 to \$24.00.

MINK — Marked interest in wild mink was shown by well filled sales room at the opening of the third day of the Canadian Fur Auction Sales Company's general sale. The catalogue of 4,913 skins covered every section and was well distributed. Bidding was lively and the 40 or more New York dealers present took an active part in it. Large dark strings, particularly Labrador and northern Quebec, brought a top price of \$37.50. Highest price for eastern skins was \$31.75 and for western \$22.50. Total room estimated 80 percent sold at close to February prices.

RANCH MINK — There was brisk demand for the 8,072 ranch mink and the sales room estimate was that 80 percent changed hands at prices on a par with the February sale. All types were represented with the highest percentage realized by Yukon and western types.

These ran from \$20.25 to \$40.00. Ontario types reached \$32.75. The catalogue consisted entirely of fresh lots of varieties but seasonable quality. Low grades brought from \$1.70 for furs to \$8.25 for twos and were 33% sold, averaging \$73.61, with nine pelts selling at \$120.00 each being one lot of 4 and one lot of 2. The above table shows a slight decline in price as compared with the percentage sold yet the price realized on a quality basis compared favourably with those obtaining on the January sale. Platinum and Platinum silvers selling up to \$195.00; white marked silvers up to \$130.00 and Standard Silvers in our Show collection up to \$120.00.

The absence of buyers and buying orders from South America and Mexico and the United States buyers uncertain as to what reaction the 2 percent tax, which was to go into effect in the United States on April 1st on manufactured articles may have with the buying public, caused considerable hesitancy in purchasing for future requirements.

We now plan to offer our second special collection on the June sale which is scheduled to open on the 20th.

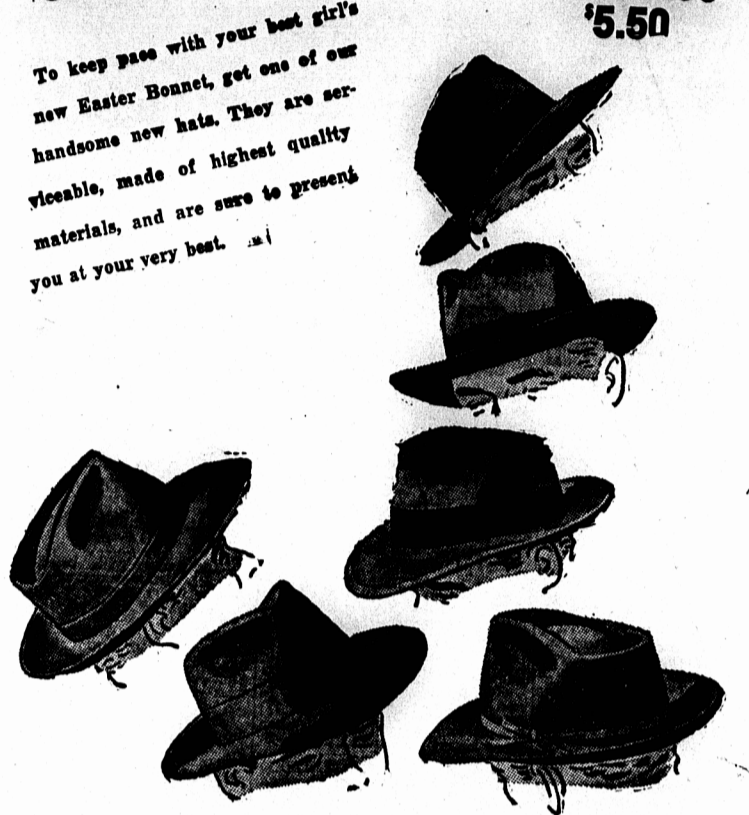
