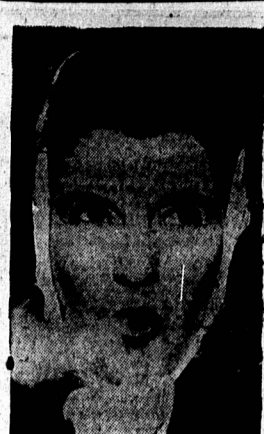

excluded us from North Korea, Manchuria and Central Europe. They thought Britain was too poor and America too near a depression to bother them when they launched their post-war expansion program. But Britain is coming back from what once looked like near retirement from the Middle East. She is trying to re-align the Arab States into an anti-Communist bloc, and is arming them. The United States has expanded in the same area in terrific fashion, is now supporting large armies in Greece and Turkey and backing them with naval force, and is making a start on a similar program in Iran. (An important arms deal with Iran is now in the making.) There is every prospect that within a few months there will be a unification of anti-Communist military strength throughout Western Europe by means of treaties on arms standardization. Russian protests over United States aerial surveillance of her Pacific shipping probably is only the first of a lot of things she will find to complain about in that area. America is about to throw her full weight behind the Nationalist Government which is fighting the Communists in China. By the time the occupation of Japan ends—even if international developments permit that within a relatively short time—Uncle Sam will be ready to police the Pacific. Outposts which were quickly over-run by the Japanese last time are now being fitted to become great bases for both aerial and naval striking forces. The army is spending tens of millions of dollars for a vast permanent base on Okinawa alone. Contracts for nearly \$20,000,000 worth of troop housing were let a year and a half ago, and other great construction projects are under way. All of these efforts are defensive and even distasteful. But they will continue complaints or not complaints, until such time as Imperial Communism is suppressed or ceases to be aggressive. The big hope is that they will convince the Russians that the chips are down, that they cannot cross the line without breaking world peace, and that they may thus be prevented from taking chances.

New Brunswick Is Expanding Her Fisheries

By IRVING WHYNOT (Canadian Press Staff Writer) FREDRINGTON, Feb. 2.—(CP)—New Brunswick, a comparatively small producer of fish among Canada's seacoast provinces, is making a determined effort to put her fisheries into the realm of big business. The sardine industry has been encouraged to an extent where it now brings shore fishermen more than \$1,500,000 a year and the government is subsidizing efforts to introduce modern dragners into the Bay of Fundy. With government financial assistance, a dragger was put into operation in the stormy Bay of Fundy early this year and was termed a "major experiment" in the fight to expand Fundy fisheries. Success of the trip might lead to an additional \$1,000,000 income in the cultivation of the roe-fish industry alone and would almost definitely bring additional dragners into the strip of water between the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia shores. The dragger, which is the first to operate in the Bay of Fundy, might also be used in the scallop fisheries which fishermen from Digby, N.S., now control almost without competition. Provincial officials say scallops are available in large quantities in deep Bay of Fundy waters and say the dragger is the "ideal vessel" to bring them up from the deep. The dragger, which catches fish by trolling a cone-shaped net behind, is considered a much more economical method of fishing than the more generally-used method of trawling and hand-lining. The dragger, too, is a more comfortable ship and catches less "trash" or non-marketable fish.

because the net can be lowered to the depth which scientific investigations have proven are the best spots for the type of fish wanted. The fisheries industry in New Brunswick is already a \$20,000,000 business and officials say it can be "expanded greatly." If the Fundy experiment is successful, the provincial fleet which operates in the Gulf of the St. Lawrence during ice-free months may also be shifted to the Fundy during winter months. The five-vessel fleet that was introduced last year out of Carleton Place has already doubled fishermen's income in that area. The dragners, however, have met opposition. J. Fred Belyea, a member of the Saint John city council and a fisherman himself, told the council that dragners deplete the fisheries and kill off young fish. This cuts into the livelihood of the majority of provincial fishermen, he said. Instead of dragners, he suggested that artificial fish culture be introduced in an effort to expand the industry. The sardine industry, although 25 years old, has just begun to bring New Brunswick fishermen a measure of prosperity during the last seven years. During the first 11 months of 1947, record catches netted sardine fishermen \$1,487,000. Sardine fishermen say they expect an even better season during 1948 and hope to dig into the big market now satisfied by the \$481,904 worth of sardines imported from Norway during the past year.

where the present King and Queen, Winston Churchill, the late Franklin D. Roosevelt and several Governors-General have broken bread. Here too is Mr. King's dog "Pat", fourth of a succession of "Pats" who have had the run of the Prime Minister's home. It is regarded as certain that even in retirement, MacKenzie King will continue to be the bachelor master of Laurier House. Canada is one of the few countries which provides no official residence for the head of the Government. The British Prime Minister has both No. 10 Downing street and the great country house of Chequers. The President of the United States has the White House and Blair House for distinguished guests. The French Prime Minister has "Matignon" as his official residence, while Franco of Spain and Salazar of Portugal have state-owned palaces to live in. Members of all political parties and groups in Canada's House of Commons have come to the opinion that it is only fitting for this country to provide an official residence for the head of the Government. The late Viscount Bennett occupied a 10-roomed suite at the Chateau Laurier. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen occupied a plain home in the centre of the city. The late Sir Robert Borden lived in a handsome structure surrounded by beautiful grounds on the shores of the Rideau River. Sir John A. Macdonald had the most imposing residence of all, "Earnsccliffe" on the shores of the Ottawa River, now occupied by the United Kingdom High Commissioner to Canada. Just last year the Government acquired a fine large mansion on a cliff overlooking the Ottawa and Gatineau rivers and the Laurentian hills. Located between the French Embassy and the Dominion-owned Rockcliffe Park, it is diagonally across from Rideau Hall, official residence of the Governor-General. This property and its four acres of grounds has been temporarily loaned to the High Commissioner of Australia, but may yet be renovated, redecorated from cellar to attic and converted into the 10 Downing Street of Ottawa. Surely, say the hierarchies of Canada's political parties, the Prime Minister of the Dominion is entitled to freedom from the housing shortage.
