514 Wounded Veterans On Board Hospital Ship

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—The storm-battered Jonathan Elmer, with 500 reassignment troops, docked today after weathering a 70-mile an hour hurricane en route from France, which caused the ship to roll as much as 40 degrees from centre.

PACIFIC - Superforts hurt 3,000 tons of fire bombs on four Japanese cities; Manila, communique discloses American ships in Makassar Strait; planes sink 23 small Japanese vessels, off Korea and southern Ryukyus; six small Marianas Islands, brought under American control. CHINA - Chinese battle to recapture Linchow. POLAND - Formation of new Polish Government announced. HOLLAND - Amsterdam welcomes return of liberated troops.

May Fish Landings For Maritimes Down

HALIFAX, June 28 (CP)—Fish landings in Maritime waters last month dropped sharply from those of May last year, it was shown in the monthly report issued here today by the Eastern Fisheries Division. Landings in May this year totalled \$1,085,100 pounds with a value of \$4,985,242, compared with \$2,209,600 pounds with a value of \$4,863,898 in May, 1944. The decrease was most marked in the herring and sardine fisheries, with catches of lobsters, cod and herring holding up well.

Slovaks Plan Extensive Controls By The State

BRATISLAVA, June 28 (Delayed)—(AP)—Extensive state control of schools, trade unions, large industries, forests and mines, are among the plans envisaged for the Slovak state of the Czechoslovak republic. "Our plan is not socialist, but democratic," said Charles Schmiedte, communist co-president in the dual party coalition council governing the state. This country is at the crossroads of eastern and western cultures and is feeling for the first time the heavy impact of the Soviet governmental philosophy.

Protest Delay In Providing Hospitalization

Delegation From Legion Plans To Interview Veterans' Affairs Minister. A resolution strongly protesting against the delay in providing hospitalization facilities in this Province for veterans was unanimously passed at the regular monthly meeting last night of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion.

London Poles Seek Refuge In Canada

LONDON, June 28 (Friday)—(The Canadian Press)—A delegation consisting of Stefan Litniewski, secretary of the London Polish Government, now winding up its affairs, is seeking refuge in Canada, with Montreal favored, or in Europe. The London regime would be supplanted when the Allies recapture the rival Lublin administration, now broadened by agreement with the Allies.

Atlantic Storm Is Diminishing

BOSTON, June 28—The Boston Weather Bureau said tonight the Atlantic storm "continues to diminish slowly in intensity and shows indication of increasing northward movement. There are insufficient reports to accurately locate the centre but it appears to be near latitude 42 degrees north and longitude 64 degrees west, moving east-northeastward about 14 to 18 miles per hour. Winds of 30 to 40 miles per hour are occurring over the water in a radius of 250 miles of the centre."

3,000 Tons Of Fire Bombs Used In Raids

By The Canadian Press More than 3,000 tons of fire bombs were showered on Sasebo, big Japanese naval base city, and three other Nipponese centres—Mojji and Nobeok, on Kyushu, and Okayama on Honshu—early today by 450 to 500 American Superfortresses. Six small Marianas Islands stretching 300 miles north of Saipan, Superfortress bombers have been brought under American control, Pacific Fleet headquarters announced yesterday.

Victory Parade At Amsterdam

AMSTERDAM, Holland, June 28 (CP Cable)—Amsterdam went wild with delight today as its three-armed harbor bridge was crowned by a visit from Queen Wilhelmina and a great parade of Canadian and Dutch troops. More than 30,000 citizens jammed the streets in the centre of the city to see the Queen for the first time in more than five years as she stood on the balcony of her palace overlooking Dam Square. The Queen was accompanied by Gen. Creer, Canadian army commander, and the burgomaster, Heinrich de Boer.

Reserve Brigade Group To Camp At Beach Grove

The 42nd Reserve Brigade Group consisting of units from Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, and Cape Breton, will camp at Beach Grove Training Centre on Saturday for two weeks training. The Camp Commandant is Col. G. E. Gallant, E.C. Major, Battle Mountain. The Group comprises 800 men.

More Details Of Nazi "Screwball" Weapons

PARIS, June 28 (AP)—German scientists who now are turning over their technical knowledge to the Allies have declared their belief that rockets within the next five to ten years will be used in all major theatres of the war. Col. Keck said most of these scientists have expressed willingness to go to the United States or Britain and carry on there, knowing they will never be able to continue their work in Germany.

WINDSORS GOING TO FRANCE

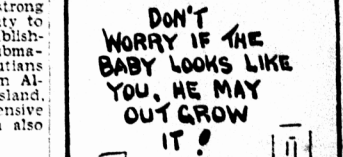
