ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Rev. W. J. Howard, Bellows Falls, Vermont and formerly of Alberton in writing to friends states: "We are all well and enjoy the climate here very much, still we would like to be back in Canada."

The last issue of Lee's Magazine published in Dallas, Texas contains a well written, illustrated article on Halifax, Mrs. Lee, the editress spent some time in Charlottetown last summer.

On Sunday evening next being Hospital Sunday in First Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Young will preach a special sermon. At this service the choir will render special music and Miss Tarbox of New England and Mr. Knowles of Toronto will sing. Both these persons possess voices of rare ability.

The dates for the artillery inspection in St. John have been finally determined for July 16, 17 and 18, and the belief is that Lord Dunsford, the commander-in-chief, will personally conduct the inspection. Advice is that he will attend; it is not yet known whether he will be present only for the muster or for the whole three days.

Among the many touching illustrations by Mrs. Conklin the following experience was given. Invited to speak in a small village, Mrs. Conklin had vivid impressions of an eight mile drive in a springless wagon, to a meeting house. When she arrived the hall was empty and the place not lighted in any way although the hour of meeting was almost up. In a short time however large numbers arrived and each one carried a candle which was lighted and carried by each individual into the meeting. After while the whole hall was a blaze of light. So each man and woman in this life might be able to do his and her part to brighten up the lives of others. "You're your small candle and I'm mine."

A meeting of the College Board of Fine Arts was held yesterday. The speaker, an appointment to the chair first made vacant by Rev. Dr. Gordon's resignation, and subsequently by the death of the Rev. Mr. Crookery. A resolution was passed to the effect that a special meeting of the board be held on September 8, to consider the matter and that an intimation of this fact be made to the students so that prospective candidates may have an opportunity of submitting names of possible candidates to the board. A committee was appointed to draft and forward a letter of condolence to Mr. Crookery's widow, the board also sending a cheque in response to an appeal made.

A DECIDED movement in population hereabouts, is noticeable this week. Owing to the great rush of visitors to the city on account of the National Educational Association, really an international institution, numbering from 25,000 to 30,000 delegates, boarding houses, hotels and depots are taxed to the limit, and in addition the transportation companies have a large exodus of city folk bound for the shore and country resorts, as well as numerous parties of tourists to take care of. If there is anyone who is not aware that baggage masters and porters do not care their wages, a brief tour of the great stations here would enlighten him. The mountains of baggage which have to be handled and the numerous extra cars which have to be added to trains, furnish men with all the work needed at present. The weather has favored the visitors. It has been fine and warm, but not exceedingly hot since the middle of last week, and there has been few cases of exhaustion reported to the police. Canada is well represented at the teachers' convention, her delegation numbering upwards of 100. At a meeting of eighty Canadian teachers today, the following officers were chosen: Dr. McKay, Halifax, director; Mr. Twindle, New Brunswick, assistant director; and Miss Besse, M. Scott, Ottawa, secretary. Hitherto the Canadian delegation has been harassed from receiving the tickets which are given out for distribution to the directors of the various organizations, but with an organization they now stand on the same footing as the other members of the association. The tourist travel to the provinces is reported "by the different companies to be somewhat ahead of last year. The steamers are all doing a good business and the long trains leaving for the maritime provinces morning and evening indicate a rapidly increasing rush seaward. The heavy outward traffic attained full headway after the holiday and is expected to continue for six weeks or more, particularly if the summer should prove to be a hot one. Thus far the indications point to a reasonably cool season, although more or less uncomfortable weather is anticipated. Boston Exchange, (J. W. Jones, Powell), is among those in attendance.

Three boats, the Janetta called by N. Gay of Powell, the Steamer by Capt. H. Judson and the Peacemaker by A. Judson, both of Alexandria, left Alexandria wharf at 10 a. m., Monday last, leaving about seventy-five people to Governor's Island in spite of contrary winds the sail to the Island was enjoyed by all, with the exception of one gentleman who was affected by the loss of a half smoked cigar which he was disappointed in not finding on the return trip. It is reported that it went down just before landing. A short but interesting race between the two leading boats, helped to enliven the party. The third boat was far in the rear, it is said, for reasons best known to the Captain. Some incidents, amusing and otherwise, occurred during the transfer of the party from the boats to the shore. On reaching the shore all repaired to the factory, where through the kindness of Mr. Judson they were treated to freshly boiled lobsters. Refreshments were then served for which it is reported some were almost too late. The ladies treated the fishermen and having discovered among them an efficient performer on the violin, arranged a dance in one of the buildings, while others occupied their time with berry-picking and sewing. About four o'clock in the afternoon, the struggles were unsummoned by the melodious strains of a dinner-bell, and after a protracted leave-taking of Governor's Island embarked again for home. Eyewitnesses declare that though the wind was fair and very light, much spray flew over the boats, dampening the clothes, but not the spirits of the party. On reaching the wharf the crews of the different boats cheered each other and breaking up into congenial parties departed for their homes, all declaring they were delighted with the day's outing. Mr. Gay is to be highly congratulated on the sailing qualities of his new yacht, which though pronounced by critics to be a heavy-weather-boat showed herself capable of surprising speed in a light breeze. Mr. Judson's boat is also a splendid sailer, and more than sustained her former reputation. The third boat though not so speedy became "very fast" on attempting to cross the rear at Governor's Island finally finishing home in company with the others.
