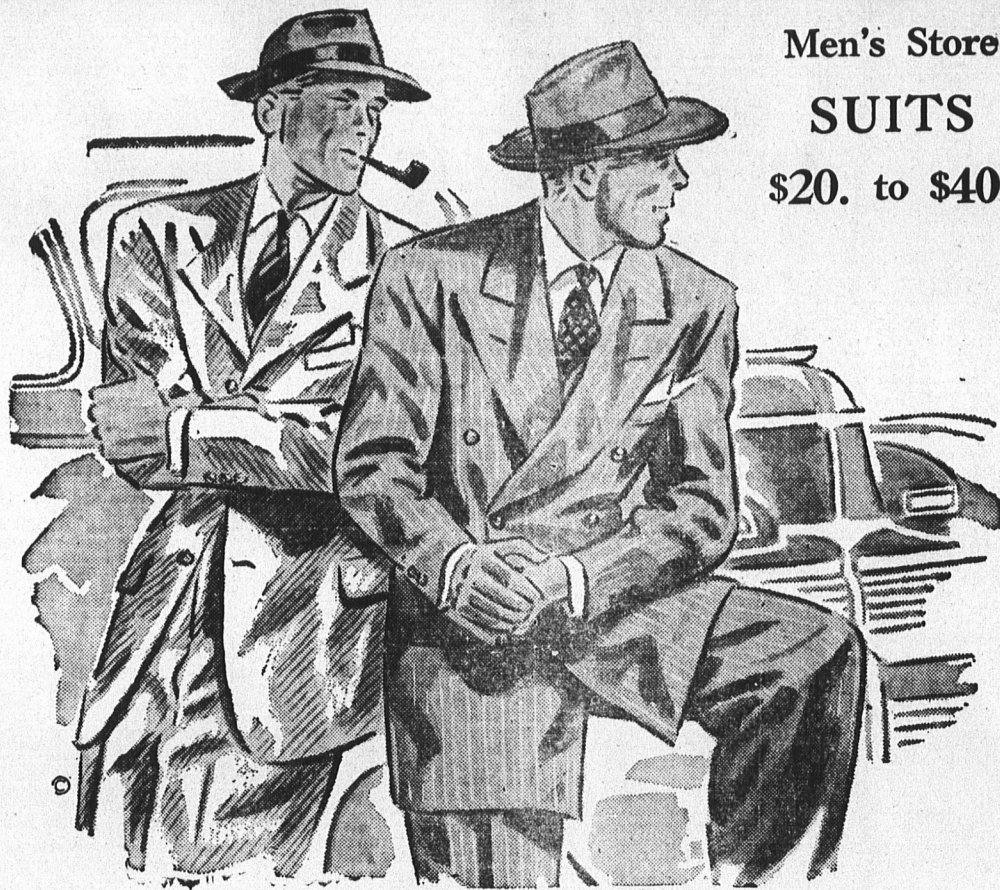

P. E. Islanders In California

(M. A. M. in Oakland Maple Leaf)
STILL YOUNG AT 88

New Year's Day, 1854, was a day of great rejoicing on the Harrington Farm, at the DeSable shore, (now known as Hampton). Prince Edward Island, for on that day the first child of young Michael Harrington and his wife, Caroline Gould, was born—the first of a family of eleven children. In the course of a few days, when the winter storms had subsided somewhat, the baby was taken to the church at Kelly's Cross, several miles away, where he was baptized and named Bennet, a name he still answers to at the age of 88 years.

As the young boy grew up, as all farm boys did in those days, he became a valuable assistant to his parents, whose 100-acre farm, which extended from the main road down to the shore line of Northumberland Strait, provided food and shelter for the growing family, but also a fair share of education in the little one-room school that stood a short distance in from the main road, not far from Villet's blacksmith shop.

Bennet's voice was musical and soon he became a singer. He knew all the songs of the day—all the "come-all-yes"—and at the fulling or after a long day's labor in the potato field, followed by a generous country supper, when all were seated around the big fire place in the kitchen, Bennet would be called upon for a song.

His rendition of the love songs of old Ireland and Bonnie Scotland brought tears to the eyes of those who a few years before had left the old land, crossed the stormy ocean and settled in the new land of Prince Edward Island.

But as the years kept traveling along, Bennet married a lovely Island girl. He remained on the farm a few years longer, then moved to Cape Traverse in the days when crossing at the Capes was made by ice boats. A few years later he moved to Massachusetts, where his wife died, leaving him with three daughters to care for. He carried on contracting and building for a number of years in the Old Bay State and then came to California about 25 years ago where he has resided ever since.

It was a pleasure, therefore, to be present when Bennet Harrington celebrated the 88th anniversary of his birth at his adopted home in Lakeport, Lake County, California, last New Year's Day.

He is still almost as active as in the days of yore. He lives with his daughter, Mrs. M. M. Stevens, chief operator of the telephone exchange at Lakeport and takes pleasure in caring for the fruit trees surrounding the comfortable home overlooking the beautiful lakes within the shadow of famed Mount Knocott.

In the city of Santa Rosa, Sonoma County, California, a young member of the Michael Harrington family, Laura, resides with her husband, namely, Mr. and Mrs. John J. Hackett, the former from Tignish, P. E. I. They also have lived in California many years.

Also in Santa Rosa is another daughter of Bennet Harrington, Mrs. Pearl Lawrence, the mother of three sons and two daughters. The eldest daughter, Frances is a nurse in a California State Hospital.

The third daughter, Corrine, died in Oakland, January 8, 1919, during the flu epidemic.

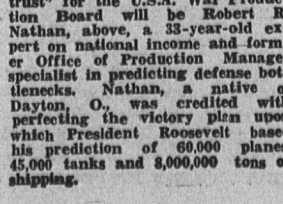

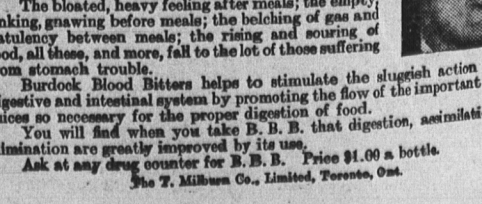

Can Double U. S. Output

WASHINGTON, March 10 — (AP) — Donald M. Nelson declared tonight that the United States output of military supplies could be doubled if all existing war production machinery were used 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Unless production is brought to victorious levels, the war production board chairman warned in a broadcast address, neither management nor labor "could survive the public wrath should that wrath be

turned against them; nor could we here on the production board."

Nelson said he had become convinced of the depth of the public demand for all-out production from a flood of telegrams and letters received after his broadcast last week demanding a 25-per cent production upturn.
