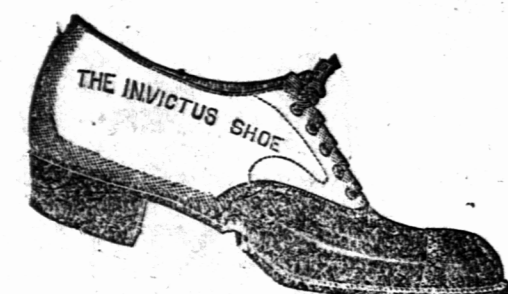
Some individual operators would like to end the strike if a method can be shown whereby they can make concessions without stultifying themselves.

McQueen, Secretary Treasurer, tendered her resignation and on motion of Rev. Mr. Spurr, seconded by Mr. Montgomery the resignation was accepted and the Secretary directed to tender the thanks of the Association to Miss McQueen for the faithful performance of the duties of her office during the past two years. Raymond, Field Secretary, conducted a very helpful exercise, answering questions from the delegates bearing on the qualifications and duties of the Sunday School teacher and the preparation of the lesson before coming before the class. He pointed out the importance of Normal Training, also that the teacher should be a Christian, be faithful, be thorough and lose no opportunity of doing personal work for Christ, and that the lesson should be so prepared as to leave lesson helps at home. Mr. George Irving gave a very earnest address in which he emphasized the fact that if we are to be used by God it is by painful soul-wrestling, that we must be alive, be endued with such power as is obtained only by personal contact with Christ. In closing Mr. Irving expressed his heartfelt desire that all might go from the Convention filled with new zeal, new yearning for souls. Rev. Mr. McLeod reviewed the work of the Annual Sunday School Convention held at Summerside last October and the work since accomplished. He showed that the results since that time justified the expenses incurred by the appointment of a Field Secretary. He appealed for more earnest support of the work and urged the delegates to greater faithfulness towards the Sunday School. Mr. Raymond in the course of his closing address referred to the Spirit of Christian fellowship noticeable at the Denver Convention where as many as twenty-five Denominations were represented. YARMOUTH, Aug. 24.—The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces assembled for its first meeting on Saturday morning. A large number of enthusiastic delegates gathered in the Zion Church and the following visiting clergymen were invited to seats in the Convention: Rev. Henry C. Vedder, Pennsylvania; Rev. Geo. B. Titus, of Boston; Rev. J. A. Gordon, of Montreal; Rev. Dr. Goodspeed and Mr. Welton of McMaster university; Rev. W. F. Armstrong, of Burnham; Rev. L. D. Morse, Rev. W. P. Stackhouse, of Manitoba; Rev. George Richardson, of Hamilton; H. L. Brittain and the officers of the W. B. M. U. A letter was then read from A. DeB. Tremaine, the convener of the joint committee from King's and Dalhousie colleges, for the purpose of arranging for a deputation from their committee to meet with the Baptist Convention for the consideration of a movement in the Maritime Provinces relative to college federation. The matter was referred, after some discussion to the committee of arrangements in conjunction with Dr. Trotter. Dr. E. M. Saunders was appointed president of the convention, and his ascent to the platform was greeted with enthusiastic applause. Other elections were Rev. Mr. Hutchinson, of Moncton, 1st vice-president; Rev. J. L. Miner, 2nd vice-president; Dr. H. C. Creed, of Fredericton, secretary of convention, and Mr. Grant, treasurer. Committee on credentials—Rev. J. H. Saunders, Rev. A. J. Archibald and Rev. J. B. Gahong.
