A GREAT CHURCH GATHERING COMING

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Several unusually important church conferences or conclaves will be held during the coming month and in view of the vital questions to be discussed and decided at some of these gatherings their outcome is awaited with a great deal of interest in church circles throughout the country. Bishops and clerical and lay deputies of the Protestant Episcopal church in the United States will gather in New York City on October 8, to the number of about eight hundred to attend the forty-third triennial general convention. It is twenty-five years since a general convention has been held in New York City and the leading clergymen and lay-

men of the diocese have made every effort to make the occasion notable in the annals of the church. The completion of the new Synod Hall, at Amsterdam avenue and 110th street, will afford a magnificent meeting place for the House of Deputies. The House of Bishops sits separately from the House of Deputies and will hold its sessions in Old Synod Hall. The delegates will come from every part of the United States and will represent the communicants of the Protestant Episcopal church in this country, of whom there are about 1,000,000. The convention will include 100 bishops and 600 deputies, 300 of whom are clergymen and 300 laymen.

 Property in Mount Street, London, where Prince Arthur of Connaught has just taken up a house for his bride-to-be, suddenly gone up in price in value. Snobs are ready to pay any rents for even a small flat in that street so as to be able, as it were, to rub shoulders with the royal pair. Several rich "climbers," whose names out of charity I suppress, are begging the agents to "get them anything there," and they will double the usual commission. It is quite an ordinary street in which there are many shops which always, more or less, depreciates a locality.

MIMIC WAR ENDS IN GREAT BATTLE

CASTEL-SARRASIN, Sept. 20, (Special)—A pitched battle in which opposing forces comprising one hundred and twenty thousand men clashed in the final struggle of the French army manoeuvres was fought near here in presence of President Raymond Poincare.
 The Northern (Blue) army, commanded by General Paul Pau, and the Southern (Red) army, led by General Nicolas Chomer, had been fighting for seven days a series of preliminary engagements along a parallelogram stretching from Montauban to Agen on the north, and from Auch to Toulouse on the south, yesterday brought the main bodies face to face, with a front extending for twenty miles in the valley of the River Gimone, a tributary of the Garonne.
 Before daybreak cavalry, artillery and infantry were stirring in preparation for the decisive battle, while aeroplanes were flitting over the respective positions endeavoring to discover the commanders' intentions.
 President Poincare, with Mr. Eugene Etienne, Minister of War, observed the battle from a hill near the town. He was surrounded by a brilliant staff and accompanied by the military attaches of the foreign embassies, among whom were Lieutenant Colonel T. Bentley Mott, of the United States Embassy in Paris, and Colonel Samuel W. Miller, U. S. A.
 The President repeatedly expressed his admiration for the endurance and marching powers of the troops. Many of the infantry regiments marched thirty to thirty-five miles yesterday, the soldiers carrying their full active equipment, weighing fifty pounds, in spite of which only few of them fell out of the ranks.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT PANAMA.
 The expected opening of the Panama Canal in 1914 stimulates our interest in the inhabitants of Panama and Columbia until its succession from that Republic in 1903, and both countries have been peopled and ruled by Spain.
 Like Columbia, Panama has many varieties of climate, from the tropical heat of the plains to the cold of the mountains. Fruits of the temperate zone flourish on the high lands while the tropical vegetation below is luxuriant. On many of the trees—orange, lemon, banana and others—green and ripe fruit and budding flowers may be seen together, because it is almost perpetual summer. One of the fruits is the rose apple, and another luscious fruit is the sapodilla, which grows on a tall tree. The aguacate or alligator pear is much used in salads. Among the beverages of the rich are naranjada, orange, lemon, banana, and others grapes, and orchards, which contain almost juice and sugar.
 The dinners of the rich, and the breakfasts also, have many courses; the tables are spread with fine linen, and set with silver, cut-glass, and china. The meals of the poor are very frugal. Families may be seen sitting on the grass in front of their cabins, dining under spreading trees. The Indians and Spanish natives make pottery from clay, use gourds for cups, and cut them to shape to take the place of spoons and knives.
 A favorite dish of the poor is a stew called, sin coche which contains a variety of ingredients. Rice is a standby. Rice and red beans are cooked together, and rice is also cooked in lard with tasado—dried beef.
 The flesh of the lapd lizard, called iguano, is said to resemble chicken. The natives slit the sides of living iguanos and take from them strings of eggs, which they hang in the sun to dry for future use.
