A Dividend of 7 1-2 per cent Declared, or 1 1-4 p. c. a Year for Twelve Years—Resolutions Passed Favoring Annual Inter-Provincial Exhibitions—Directors Decline Any Recompense for Services Rendered—Directors Elected.

Judge Warburton moved, seconded by Mr. L. L. Beer that \$750 out of the reserve fund be given to the Directors.

Before the motion was put the retiring Board unanimously declined to accept any thing for services and Judge Warburton withdrew his motion.

Dr. Taylor moved the following resolution, seconded by Mr. L. L. Beer:

Resolved that this Association recognizing the value of services of the Board of Directors hereby tender them their sincere and hearty thanks. Carried unanimously.

Mr. L. L. Beer then moved the following resolution which was seconded by Mr. G. D. Longworth:

Resolved that this meeting gladly recognizes the large and beneficial results of the past year due to the financial assistance rendered by the Provincial and Civic Governments and hereby express their congratulations of holding a similar exhibition each year and that the same recognition and assistance may be rendered by both the Provincial and Civic Governments.

The races well attended, and well conducted, proved highly remunerative, as can be seen by an examination of the accounts. As far as possible the Exhibition and Race Grounds were managed and conducted separately; this enabled all those desiring to attend the Exhibition alone
