MAIL WILL BE DROPPED FROM PLANE

Cache Found In Snow-bank Near Moncton Airport-Said Plane Bound With Wet Goods For Maine-Made Forced Landing.

For a few days at least until landing conditions in the vicinity of Charlottetown improve the plane carrying mail from Moncton will drop its load in the field opposite the Exhibition Building without landing. Those in charge of air service at Moncton state that they will not remove the skis from their plane at present as the landing field at Moncton is still covered with snow and ice. It would be dangerous to attempt to rise or land with wheels under such conditions. The plane is able to land at Summerside in Connor's Field which is favourable on account of its length. There is no such field in the vicinity of Charlottetown. The field at Falconwood where the plane landed last year is partly bare with some snow-banks remaining. Those are the reasons given by the pilot for not making his flight to Charlottetown on Monday or Tuesday. The matter was taken up with the Air Mail Service Branch at Ottawa, and through the Post Office Inspector's office the arrangement of dropping the mails was made. As the pilot will be unable to receive outgoing mail here, that mail will be forwarded to Summerside to be taken on there by the plane, and connections will then be made with all afternoon trains out of Moncton.

As the car ferry took twelve hours in making a one way trip yesterday, it was impossible for the outgoing mail to leave the Province.

On Monday the Charlottetown mail was left by the plane at Summerside. Those mails were brought to Emerald Junction and left there by the extra train, running in place of the regular train from Borden, might bring them to Charlottetown. Through some misunderstanding the extra did not take this mail on Monday evening, and left it there till yesterday morning. The Post Office does not take responsibility for the delay.

An Architect Saves Work Worry and Was

With the possible exception of "Greenwich Time", outside of a few cities, it may be taken for granted that nothing in this materialistic world is to be obtained for nothing-somewhere there is a hidden charm covering the cost of what is "given away with a pound of tea."

Everything involving time and material must be paid for, and he is most sanguine individual who believes any assertion to the contrary.

"The plans for my new house cost me absolutely nothing" remarked a man to a friend "my father threw them in gratis, a minor change of two and they were complete. I saved hundreds of dollars in architect's fees."

That saving of hundreds of dollars is something greatly desired by all of us, but it is more often achieved by employing an architect than dispensing with his services.

Every building job must have an architect or someone who functions for him and until houses are grown from seeds or bulbs that fact will remain.

An architect is trained and has the experience to know the right materials for the right place.

He can get the plans out more quickly and in better shape than the builder whose training has been to read plans and follow them rather than originate. He knows how to get the best quality for the best price on a competitive market.

When the services of a competent architect are employed this is what takes place-after a full and frank discussion between him and the owner, a set of preliminary plans are submitted. These plans are based, not on what the architect thinks the owner should have, but his conception of the owners own ideas conveyed to him.

These drawings are the first visible realization of your dream house. They can be criticized and pulled to pieces if necessary. At last emerges your house as it will be, conforming as to your individual tastes and requirements.
