## THE RETIRING COUNCIL.

The two years term of the City Council is very near its close, and it is pleasant to be able to mainly speak well of that body, especially as it is understood that most of their number if not all will seek re-election. The Council is almost wholly made up of business men, of good capacity and good repute and they appear to have endeavored to conduct the affairs of the City on honest business principles.

The finances of the City have been prudently managed, and the civic credit maintained. At the close of the year notwithstanding some special demands, the balance is on the right side of the account. Credit is due to Finance Minister Hooper and his associates on the Finance Committee for this favorable showing. At the same time it would be invidious not to mention the good work done by Chairman Paton of the Street Committee, Chairman Prowse of the Police, Chairman Stewart of the Market, Chairman Rogers of the Light, Chairman Rogers of the Public Property Committee, and last but not least, Councillor Reddin head of the Fire Board.

All these departments have apparently had careful supervision and were operated smoothly for the most part during the two years past. There have been a number of important matters dealt with including the renewal of the contract for street lighting, after obtaining power from the Legislature for the creation of a civic lighting plant; the erection of the new Market Building and a great deal done in the way of permanent improvements to our streets and sidewalks. Public order was never better maintained than during the two years past, and due credit should be given to Marshal Cameron and his force for that fact. The addition of two men a year ago was a judicious and necessary move in view of the inadequate number before, and the large area to be covered, the extensive public works being carried on near the City and the varied duties which devolve upon the men of the force.

While so much may be said in commendation of the retiring Mayor and Council, we may also venture a word of criticism. The by law which governs the clearing of the sidewalks in winter has not been enforced as it should be, and some notorious cases of neglect in that regard by prominent residents have passed unchallenged. It may be admitted that the snow-by-law has been looked after better than under some previous Councils, but the tendency has been of late towards increasing laxity.

The winter so far has been a very favorable one, and we can only hope that when the heavier snow-falls come, the new Council shortly to be elected will make a determined effort to keep the walks in passable condition. In the meantime retiring Councillors who are seeking re-election will do well to give this matter their attention. No excuse can be offered for permitting the walks in the central portion of the City remaining encumbered with snow an ice as they have been from time to time in the past.

Tomorrow the last polls will be held in the elections in the United Kingdom and in a little more than two weeks hence the New Parliament, overwhelmingly Liberal, will meet at Westminster.

## A WHISKEY MANIFESTO.

A circular is being distributed among the electors of Prince County urging them to vote against the repeal of the Scott Act. We have a copy of it now before us. It is not signed. This fact is significant. No respectable or responsible person would sign it. The persons who got it up and are circulating it are either afraid or ashamed to be known, or they feel and know that the paper is likely to be more influential and effective as an anonymous communication than it would be with their names affixed to it.

A number of the statements in the manifesto are untrue and others are misleading and delusive. Two of these may be cited. One is that the Prohibitory Law "is an arbitrary, harsh and unjust law, interfering with the rights and privileges of a private citizen." This is untrue. The Prohibitory Law has been upheld as fair, constitutional and just by the highest Court in the British Empire.


Another false statement is that should the Prohibition Act come into force in Prince County it will mean the appointment of a large number of Prosecutors and increased taxation upon the farmer's of Prince County to the amount of over \$6,000 a year. This is wholly false. The Prohibitory Law involves the appointment of no more prosecutors and no more taxation than the Scott Act. No intelligent voter is likely to be deceived by this anonymous and lying circular. It is issued by or in the interest of the convicted ransellers of Prince County. They want the Scott Act continued not that they may obey it but that they may break it.

These professedly worthy men who talk of private rights, personal liberty and the home life of each elector, would enslave your sons through drink. It is their business to destroy the home life. Even the Scott Act which they profess to favor if honestly administered would place these men behind prison bars.

Vote against the lawless ranseller every time and you cannot be far wrong. Vote against the ransellers' lying circular. Vote "against the Act" which the ranseller has made a refuge of lies to shelter himself from the penalties of his misdeeds.

The Conservatives of Nova Scotia were naturally much disconcerted by the clean sweep which the Liberals made in that Province at the last Dominion election. Quite naturally they wanted to know how it was done and whether it was done legally. At an election trial in Halifax they put Hon. Mr. Fielding on the stand and examined him for two hours, but apparently without eliciting any incriminating evidence. They kept him from attending the funeral of his colleague but that must be only a very doubtful source of satisfaction.

The need of sufficient properly equipped bathing houses at the Park is very properly being considered by the Tourist Association. The want should be supplied before the opening of next tourist season. Scores of tourists would make Charlottetown their home during the summer months instead of only giving us a transient call, if proper bathing facilities were provided. Our pretty Park with this addition would furnish an ideal spot for rest and recuperation. It is not too much to hope that the cost of the bathing houses would be indirectly returned in a single season several times over by the additional amounts expended by tourists in the city. By all means let us have the bathing houses.


