

# INCENDIARY BARN BURNING

## Threats Made Because of Attention to a Young Woman.

The following is the evidence taken before Mr. Leonard Morris, J. P., at the investigation of Daniel Loder, charged with burning the barn of Mr. Frank Jelly, Linkletter Road. The inquiry which has been adjourned until Monday next will probably be concluded on that day.

Franklin Jelly, (sworn)—I live at Linkletter Road. Daniel Loder made certain threats about a girl. He said that if anyone went to Edmund Parkman's at Linkletter Road to take Araminta Parkman away they would never get out of the yard alive, and if they did they would not bring her back alive. On Sunday afternoon, 15th December, I was going down to Mr. Parkman's. At Otis Gamble's, Daniel Loder came out. He asked me to go back and go to Joseph Schurman's. I told him I could not as I had an engagement; would go some other time. He then asked me to go to John Murray's at St. Eleanor's. I told him I could not, that I had an engagement and I was going to carry it out. He said, "If you are going down the road I'll go with you." He got in the wagon with me and we drove to Mr. Parkman's; both went into the house. I asked Miss Parkman to come to Miscouche with me. She got ready. I took the girl and went away. Loder started out ahead of me. When I got to Miscouche I met him there. I said, "Dan you got ahead of me." He said, "Yes." About 12 or 1 o'clock next day I went to harness my horse and found my harness all cut up; the reins were cut in eleven places, and several other cuts in the harness. I found when I got home that my barn was burned. There was destroyed in the barn:—8 head of cattle, about 12 tons of hay and six tons of straw, a horse power for thrasher, 3 wagons, 2 plows, 3 sets of harness, a lot of harness, 55 hens, 3 cords of wood, a lot of plank, a hay rake and sundry articles. The total loss is about \$900.00. I had \$100.00 insurance on the barn. Because of the threats he made, I suspected Daniel Loder. I did not hear him make any threats. He made the threats to my brother. He (Loder) once said to me that A. D. Pickering had 4 horses, but he might not have any by the spring.

Edward Jelly, (sworn)—Five or six days ago Dan Loder said to me that if anybody went to Parkman's and took that girl away for a drive they would never get her out of the yard unless it was a lot better man than he was, and if they came and got her away they would never bring her back. He would watch them on the road. He said he did not care if he was

put in jail for it, or if he was hung the next minute,—that was the way he was built. This was said at our house. He said, "If I don't get her, nobody else will."

Mrs. Lena McNeil, (sworn) I live at Miscouche. Daniel Loder was at my place Sunday night, 15th December. He came to our place about 3 or 4 o'clock in the afternoon. He stayed about half an hour, then went away.

William Parkman, (sworn) My home is at New Glasgow. I have been visiting at Linkletter Road at my brother's, Edwin Parkman, I was there on Sunday night, the 15th inst. I saw Daniel Loder there on Sunday, the 15th. He was not there on Sunday night until after I went to bed. I went to bed at half past ten. My brother took down the clock and told me the time. Loder's room adjoined mine. I laid awake an hour after I went to bed. I did not hear Loder come in. My brother has the boy hired. He was very civil to me.

Patrick Daly, constable, (sworn) I arrested Daniel Loder at Linkletter Road. I examined his clothing after we came to Summerside. I found about two cards of matches. A. D. Pickering and Harry Harvie brought in some clothes for the prisoner from Linkletter Road. They brought the clothes to me to examine. I examined them. I left the money and receipts in the clothes, and the knife I took out and gave it to the Justice, (Morris), I went out this morning (Dec. 16) and brought his clothes in from Mr. Parkman's. A girl, I suppose was Mr. Parkman's daughter, showed me the clothes. There is a coat with a razor case, a pipe and a pair of cuffs. (Coat examined in Court Room. Found in pockets: A razor in case, 1 Jew's harp, 2 nails, 1 pipe, 1 pair gloves, 1 necktie.) I heard Loder say in your (the Justice's) office that he was at Miscouche on Sunday night, Dec. 15, and got home at a quarter past ten, when he went up stairs and wound his watch. He said he left Miscouche at about 7 o'clock.
