**Scout News and Notices**

Five hundred and thirty Canadian Boy Scouts earned the coveted King's Scout Badge last year.

His Excellency the Governor-General carried out his first official function as Chief Scout for Canada by presiding over the Scout or Wolf Cub attaining the highest rank badge in Ottawa of the Canadian General Council of the Boy Scouts Association.

Boy Scouts in Canada in 1945 earned 25,504 Proficiency Badges, an increase of 1282 over the previous year's total of 24,222. These badges were in addition to 26,277 rank badges including Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, and other special badges.

Strafford, Ont., Board of Education accepted a scholarship provided by the Boy Scouts Association in that city for the Scout or Wolf Cub attaining the highest academic standing and greatest proficiency in Scout work. The scholarship is to be awarded annually.

Canada's 2167 Scout Groups, made up of 1715 Wolf Cub Packs and 1948 Scout Troops are sponsored mostly by churches. The affiliation of Canadian Scout Groups are as follows: Anglican 384; Baptist 64; Canadian Legion 26; Community 562; Handicapped 18; Luther 12; Pentecostal 26; Lutheran 7; Presbyterian 112; Roman Catholic 309; Salvation Army 57; Service Clubs 108; United Church 333; other groups 148.

The first Boy Scout Camp in history was held on Drown's Island off the Dorset coast of England in July, 1907. It was conducted by Lord Baden-Powell, Founder of the Scout Movement. Lord Baden-Powell was one of the members of this original Scout Camp.

The Scout Troop in Plaster Rock, a small lumber town west of the main track in New Brunswick, has an unique record. Tilton Sutton, the Scoutmaster, has been in the job for 21 years. The Troop records show that 198 former members of the Troop served in the armed forces. Members of the Troop were awarded 7 D.F.C., 3 M.C., 3 M.M., 1 D.F.M., and one Silver Star.

**Foreign Exchange Control Bill Given Second Reading**

OTTAWA, July 2—(CP)—A bill aimed at extending foreign exchange controls and another aimed at curbing the operations of cartels, monopolies and cartels were dealt with today when the Commons reconvened after the holiday period.

**Appeals Dismissed in CCF Libel Suits**

TORONTO, July 4—(CP)—Appeals brought by William D. Denison and 13 associates, all members of the C. C. F. party, against dismissal of their libel actions were dismissed today by Ontario Court of Appeal.

The group had brought libel actions against Montague Alfred Sanderson of the Globe Printing Co., Ltd., and the Globe Printing Company and its president, George McCullagh. The case was an outgrowth of the Ontario Municipal Election campaign of 1943 in which the C. C. F. party presented a solid slate for Board of Control, Board of Education and City Council.

**WILD FOX SUSPECT**

Veterinarian has chalked up another indictment against the fox. Wild red foxes have been a serious factor in the spread of rabid and hydrophobia in more than 14 of the United States during the past year, according to the American Veterinary Medical Association. Normally wary and elusive, a fox with rabies will attack viciously and without fear. Pastured livestock are particularly subject to rabid fox bites. While foxes, skunks and wild cats may all spread rabies, the fox is still the most common disseminator of the disease. In Canada, throughout the Dominion, the Health and Animal Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, contagious disease, has not yet been reported. No case of glanders has occurred for seven years, and in the case of epizootic outbreaks of hog cholera, thrax, mange, and rabies, steps for eradication are at once taken.
