BACK ON A VISIT—Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Dunfield, Alberta, formerly of Long River, have arrived to spend the winter in this Province and are at present the guests of the former's brother-in-law, Mr. James Brodie of this city. Mr. Bernard has been very successful during his three years in the west, having had a fine wheat crop last year, which even after the hail storms so prevalent there, averaged about 22 bushels to the acre, while others who were not in the hail region averaged about 35 to 50 bushels per acre. The average price was 75c per bushel for No. 1, and 65c for No. 3. The farmers are going more than ever into mixed farming and dairying, the abundance of rain are very promising for next year's crop.

## IN MEMORIAM

JAMES A. MacEWEEN

There passed away in the P. E. I. Hospital, Charlottetown, on December 11th, after a short illness, one of the residents of St. Peter's Bay, in the person of James A. MacEween, at the age of sixty-four years.

A few days before, he stood on a nail, which led to blood-poisoning resulting in tetanus. The end came suddenly and his death was a great shock to the community. For many years, he travelled extensively as an agent, and was widely known. He was a man of a kind and cheerful spirit, whose presence will be missed in the community and the Presbyterian Church, where he was a regular worshipper. He was a brother of the late Dr. Henry McEween of Summerside, and is survived by his wife and a family of five daughters and one son, Lloyd in Sanjour, B. C. Another son, Lloyd, a brilliant law student of Lousis, a brilliant law student of Saskatchewan University, was killed in action, overseas, on November 14th, 1917.

The daughters are: Mrs. Wm. N. Stewart, Saskatoon; Mrs. S. Wood, Strathcona; Mrs. Alex. McKinnon, St. Peter's and Florrie of the community. The sympathy of the community goes out to the family in the sudden and sore bereavement. The funeral was largely attended on the 13th and the interment was in Midgee Cemetery. The services at the house and grave were conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. M. McLeod, who spoke words of comfort and warning from the Saviour's counsel. Watch for ye, for ye know not, when the Master of the house cometh."

## MR. NEIL McDONALD

A wide circle of relatives and friends were shocked to hear of the death of Mr. Neil McDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald McDonald, of Milo, Lot 5, which occurred in the P. E. I. Hospital on December 16th. Mr. McDonald, who was only 24 years, just a young man on the threshold of life, entered the Hospital on November 16th, having taken ill only the day previous while on active duty as chef of the Queen Hotel, where he was one of the most popular employees. He was suddenly stricken on Tuesday night and on Friday was taken to the Hospital and operated upon successfully for appendicitis on Saturday. Mr. McDonald was making a good recovery when striking on two weeks later with typhoid fever and was convalescing nicely from it when he suddenly passed away on Sunday morning with hardly a moment's warning, notwithstanding the best of medical skill and attendance. The late Mr. McDonald had only been married a little over a year and leaves to mourn at his home, 22 Bellevue, a wife, Belle Livingstone, who is daily at his bedside and did all that a devoted wife could do to bring him to renewed health but a divine Providence willed otherwise and he is now at rest in his Father's Heavenly home.

The funeral from his home, 22 Bellevue, on Monday was recently held by Rev. Wm. Orr Muldoon, assisted by Rev. Ewen McDougall, and wended its way to the Railway Station, the remains being forwarded to his old home for burial. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Malcolm Gillis, Neil McLean, Hugh McKay, Thomas Spencer, Fredrick Duff and Daniel McPherson.

Many beautiful floral offerings were received as follows: From his wife, a pillow; a wreath, Father and Mother; Wreaths from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas White, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. S. McLure, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Wood, Charlottetown Hotel, Sprays from Mr. and Mrs. Neil McDougall, Mr. and Mrs. James McEachern, Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Livingstone, Miss Bessie McDonald. The funeral from his father's residence in Milo on Thursday, after the arrival of his brothers from the United States, was conducted by the Rev. Ewen McDougall at the house and at the grave by Rev. Mr. Tatteree and the members of the Orange Order, Bethel Lodge. Mr. McDonald was a member of Borne Lodge, Charlottetown. The pall bearers here were: Messrs. Boston Crozier, John McFadyen, William Wallace, Richard Wood, Russell Rogers and Harry McNeven. Besides his bereaved wife, he leaves to mourn his father and mother, seven brothers and four sisters who were all at the funeral except his eldest sister Mrs. Potts of Rosedale, Mass., who was unable to come home.
