A PARTIAL eclipse of the moon took place last night and as the night was a very clear one it could be very plainly seen in the city and throughout the province. This is the second eclipse of the moon this year but the first one to be visible in North America. The moon entered the shadow at about 10.30 o'clock last evening, and for two hours the shadow crept up its face and then receded covering at its height, one fifth of the face and leaving it clear again at 12.45 o'clock. The moon was full last evening the exact time being at 11.31 o'clock, or about 33 minutes after the shadow began to creep over its face. A total eclipse of the sun will take place Aug. 30. This is visible from Labrador and partially so from Charlottetown. The sun will enter the shadow here at about 6.45 o'clock in the morning and it will not be entirely clear until 8.53. About two-thirds of the sun's face will be hidden in the shadow here at the height of the eclipse.

ONE of the heaviest storms for years prevailed in the west part of the Island Saturday night. Several barns were struck by lightning.

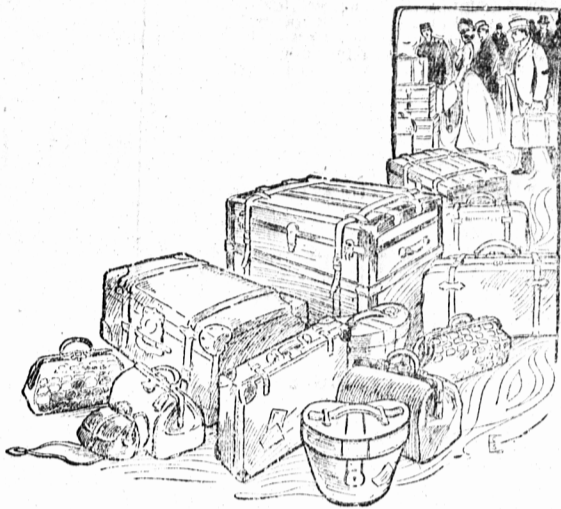
