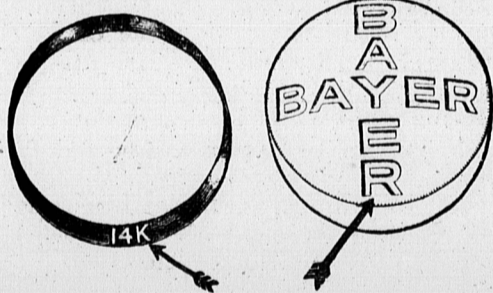

Shipping News

CHAIRMAN OF CUNARD LINE PREDICTS SLUMP IN FREIGHT RATES

Speaking at the annual meeting of the Cunard Steamship Company in Liverpool, England, Sir Alfred Booth, Chairman of the Company, said it was quite possible for a slump in freight rates and that the sooner the storm was over the better.

Sir Alfred added that he hoped the slump would result in a definite break in the "vicious circles of rising wages and rising prices."

STEAMER WESTGATE A DERELICT

A message to C. H. Harvey, of the Marine and Fisheries Department Halifax, from the steamer Tarantula, stated that at 2 p. m., Greenwich time, Thursday the steamer had passed a derelict vessel in latitude 40.42 north, longitude 63.47 west. The ship was lying on her starboard side high out of water, her mast gone, but deck fittings in good order.

RECORD YEAR FOR C. P. O. S. PASSENGER TRAFFIC

The Canadian Pacific Ocean Service, St. John, report a record for the season just closed in ordinary passenger travel through St. John, 35,981 incoming and 19,325 outward. The former included 1,183 military men. In the previous sea-

son 7,000 more passengers arrived in St. John but 21,737 more military than in the season just closed.

SCHOONER MAKES FAST TRIP FROM NFLD.

After lying outside all night the schooner Helen Vair, Captain Joseph Ashford, arrived in Halifax Thursday from Marystown, Nfld., with a cargo of dried fish. She has on board 2,080 quintals, which she will start to discharge at once, after which she expects to load general cargo for Newfoundland. The schooner made a very fast trip, under present weather conditions, taking only four days to come to Halifax. Another schooner sailed from Burin for Halifax on the same day as the Helen Vair sailed from Marystown, but has not reached port as yet.

The Helen Vair was built at Liverpool 14 years ago, but does not appear to be half her age. Her net tonnage is 79 tons.

SEALER DEPARTS FOR MAGDALENS

The Canadian Sealer which has been laid up for the winter at Souris, sailed last night for the Magdalen Islands with the freight she had on board. The Guide left yesterday, clearing the balance of freight at Souris for delivery in the Magdalens. Communication with these Islands is therefore now open and the regular sailings will be maintained by the Guide, once a week from Souris.

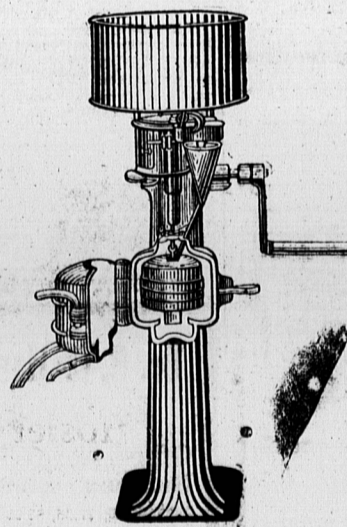


BRIDE IN \$4 GOWN GROOM IN DENIM

In a phase of yesterday's local assault upon the H. C. L., the expense of one of the most costly expressions of art—a wedding dress—was reduced just 98 per cent. The novel object lesson was furnished by Miss Gertrude Reinhardt of 28 Aetna street, Cypress Hills, Brooklyn, and W. Ramsey Frederick of 294 West Eighty-fifth street, who were married in the Waldorf-Astoria just as the protest parade was starting. The bride wore a wedding dress of blue chambray gingham that cost exactly \$4. The bridegroom wore conventional blue overalls, and the clergyman, the Rev. Dr. W. D. Tuckey, pastor of the Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church, Cypress Hills, and the best man, Joseph R. Reinhardt, Jr. brother of the bride, also donned blue jeans. To be consistent the maid of honor, Miss Frances Grotzky of Garden City, wore a dress of blue checked gingham.

When the bride said she was willing to sacrifice the white satin, point lace and orange blossoms, so dear to the conventional bride's heart, and become an object lesson in economy, Mrs. W. K. Frederick, mother of the bridegroom, said she would make her a wedding dress that would bring down the cost of a wedding gown almost 100 per cent, and thus came into vogue the overall jumper suit for the feminine world.

The bride's overall wedding dress was a one piece suit of chambray gingham with a jumper waist and a modified harem skirt reaching well above the ankles. The skirt's opening for the bridal ankles were edged with narrow bands of white lace. The sleeves and a deep turned collar were of white lawn. Bride and bridegroom met while he was training for the air force of the army at Mineola. When he got his commission he was assigned to the intelligence department and was for some time a despatch bearer in France. They renewed their romance after the armistice.
