Freighter Arrives For Pit Props

The Swedish freighter S.S. Kallegerat, Capt. E.S. Johnsson, arrived at Georgetown at 5:30 yesterday morning to load a cargo of pit props for the United Kingdom. The coal-burning 1,319-ton ship called direct from Garston, England, and was 10 days making the crossing. She carried 26 officers and men. Loading operations began at 3 p.m. yesterday and will continue the remainder of the week. Her cargo will consist of approximately 1,000 cords, put aboard by the Bergman Construction Company.

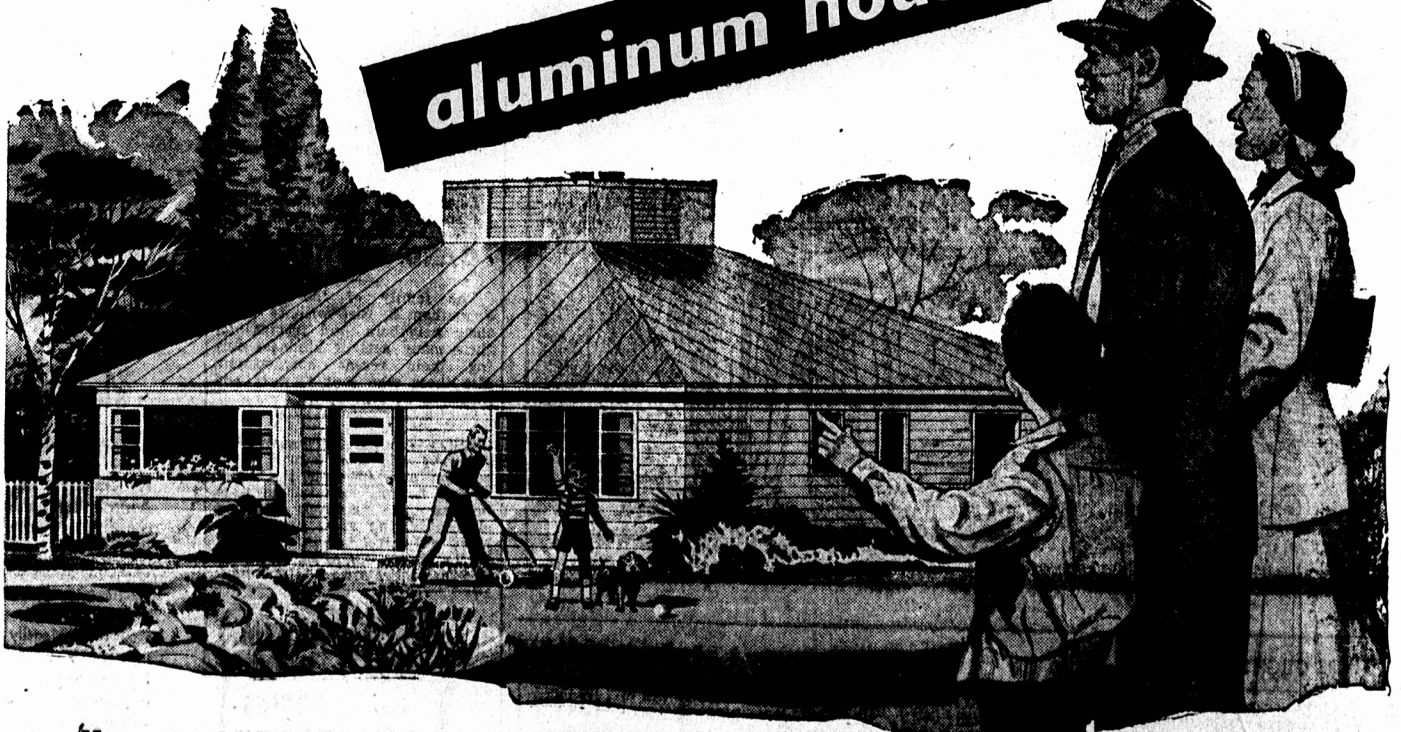
