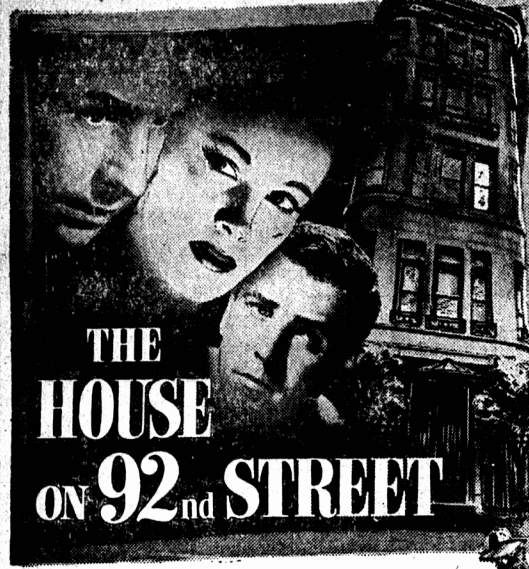

**In Memoriam**

Friends and relatives were shocked to learn of the sudden death of George H. Boyle of Cornwall at the P.E.I. Hospital, Sunday, Oct. 21st, in his 69th year.

The late Mr. Boyle although in failing health for some time only respect the hospital for observation on Thursday proceeding his death. However all that medical skill could do was in vain as he passed peacefully during the early morning hours.

He had been a lifelong farmer but had always freely given of his whole life and talents to any cause that would be of a benefit to his neighbours or the community as a whole. His work in the local school will long be remembered as he had served as Secretary for the past 24 years. The loss sustained by Cornwall United Church will be hard to fill as he had always been a regular attendant and kind and helpful member of the church. He was also chairman of the trustee board, he also devoted considerable time to the improvement of the cemetery and other church property.

The funeral was held on Wednesday October 24th, the loss sustained by Cornwall United Church where the church was over-crowded by those who had come from far and near to pay their last tribute of respect to one who was highly esteemed by all. The service at the church was conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. R. Skinner assisted by Rev. A. E. Todd of North River Baptist Church, Rev. J. W. Sawdon, Port, Greenville, S. I. and Rev. E. S. Weeks.

Mr. Skinner in paying his tribute stated that Cornwall Church had lost one of its most ardent and devoted members and that it was only after searching the scriptures that he found a text most suitable which was from Acts 13 verse 36 (For David after he had served his own generation by the will of God fell asleep... He name sunng during the service were, The Lord is My Shepherd, Unto The Hills, and Abide With Me.

He was laid to rest in adjoining cemetery beside his wife the former Emma C. Weeks who predeceased him 26 years ago.

There are left to mourn the loss of a kind and devoted Father, two daughters and two sons, namely, (Edith) Mrs. E. Edson Newman, Hunter River, (Tillie) Mrs. Bruce MacDougall, O'Leary, Peroy at Hunter River and Gordon at home.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**CHARLES L. TRAINOR**

The sudden death of Charles L. Trainor, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Malachias Callaghan, Charlottetown, came as a great shock to his many friends, both here and in Waltham, Mass. October 21, 1945, marked the end of his sojourn in this life and his passage to eternity.

Born at Johnson's River, P. E. I., April 28, 1887, he was one of the large family of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Trainor. In 1910 he took up residence in Waltham, Mass., where five years later he married Jessie McGilvray of Antigonish. He had chosen well as no wife could have been more devoted to her spouse, especially during his many periods of illness. As owner and manager of a large fuel oil establishment in Waltham, his jovial disposition served only to increase his trade and add to his large number of friends. Always a devout Catholic, he was a loyal member of that great organization, The Holy Name Society.

A few years ago ill health obliged him to sell his business to the late Mr. Waltham physician, who came to the Island to see him, and the numerous visits of Dr. J. A. MacMillan, destined to claim him on the above mentioned date.

The circumstances of his death are a fitting tribute to his faith. He had just attended Sunday Mass at the Sacred Heart Home, and after returning to the Callaghan residence, he stated that he did not feel very well, and so retired to bed. He had no sooner done so when he passed suddenly away. Immediate spiritual and medical aid was given.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**SISTER CECILIA JOSEPH, C.S.M.**

In the early morning of November 3rd, the soul of Sister Cecilia Joseph, a most valued member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Martha, passed to its eternal reward.

The deceased sister, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Gallant, was born at Esmond Bay thirty-four years ago. She received her early education in the district school and at Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's Colleges. In September, 1900, she entered the Novitiate of the Sisters of St. Martha, Charlottetown, and seven years later bound herself irrevocably to God by the triple vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Her intellectual endowments, and especially her rare musical talent, were soon recognized. For several years she continued her studies in music and obtained an Honor Diploma from McGill University. As director of the choir at Saint Dunstan's, she was a very high level. She will long be remembered by the students for her quiet efficiency, her cheerful optimism, and her unflinching devotion to duty. She will be greatly missed in the community she served so well, and where she continued her studies in her deep faith and simple piety were an inspiration to her sister religious.

Her great suffering of the last weeks she bore with Christian courage and perfect resignation to the Divine Will. Fortified by extremeunction and Holy Viaticum, she gave back her pure soul to her Creator on the anniversary of her birth.

Of her immediate family four sisters and two brothers survive her: Sister Mary Theodora, of the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Martha; Sister St. Adelbert, of the Sisters of the Holy Family; Sister St. Bernadette, of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family, Valleyfield; Madeleine Misouche Convent; Theodore and Alphonse at home.

The funeral was held Monday, November 5th, following a Solemn Requiem High Mass in the Chapel of the Sisters of St. Martha. The celebrant, the Reverend Lawrence Landrigan, St. Peter's, was assisted by the Rev. Dr. J. E. O'Hanley, Deacon; the Rev. F. L. Cass, Subdeacon; Arthur McInnis, Master of Ceremonies; Presbyter Hamill and John Cash, Acolytes; and Francis Ledwell, Thurifer.
