## AMONG THE HORSES

The Brockton races have filled well.

The Leading Lady, 2:07, has a colt at her side by Etawab, 2:03.

Charles Price of Cleveland has bought the Canadian pacer Gano Todd, 2:09 1/2.

"Doc" Tanner will take William and the other Billings horses to Cleveland this month.

Edgar Campbell, owner of Bob Mac, 2:13 1/2, has added Harry L., 2:24 1/2 to his stable.

The Canadian pacer Allen B., 2:12 1/2 is among the latest additions to the Cox Stable.

A number of horsemen from Maine are talking about participating in the Maritime circuit.

Northern Spy, 2:25 1/2, who has raced in the province, has been bought by H. Porter, Plymouth, Mass.

The Horse Review Futurity received 1105 nominations, which is upwards of 900 more than the event than in 1915.

Frank Fox has six head of fast second and green trotters and pacers at the New England Speed Sale this week.

Will Fleming is at Indianapolis with the Canadian pacers, Joe Patchen III, 2:08 1/2; The Beaver, 2:05 1/2, and The Badger, 2:15 1/2.

An effort is to be made to once more get The Friend, 2:05 1/2, to the races. The little black horse took his record eleven years ago.

Verbena Ansel, 2:22, who was picked to be one of this season's crack 3-year old trotters, died at Lafayette, Ind., last week.

Harvey Ernest's unbeaten trotter, Int Jay, will cut into the Grand Circuit at Poughkeepsie and follow along into Albany.

Simmassie, 2:08 1/2 by Simmocolon, of the Leaman stable, Halifax has a fine filly foal by Brage, son of Baring, dam Jessie Rampart by Rampart.

Dimple K., 2:13 1/2, well-known to New Brunswick trot followers, now owned by R. M. Allen, Columbia Falls, Me., has a filly foal by Bangor 2:07 1/2.

Baring, 2:12 1/2, formerly owned in Halifax, has been purchased from Walter Cox by H. Crossman, of Portland, Me., and will be placed in the stud.

Halifax will probably have a meeting June 21-22. The match race between Rex Heart, 2:14 1/2, and Bob Mac, 2:13 1/2, for \$500 a side, which was to have come off on the ice, will likely be decided at that meeting.

Jack Leyburn 2:04 1/2, the property of Joseph Lipsitz, of Bridgeport, Conn., and Lew Perkins 2:09 1/2, owned by R. J. Hall, of Ansonia, Conn., are matched to race for a purse of \$2,000 on May 30, according to a Bridgeport, Conn., paper.

The sale in New York the other day of Sir Adam Becks horses was very satisfactory. Sir Edward, a bay gelding, by Tupelo, that was the middle-weight champion of the National Horse Show, made the top price of \$3,600. Winnetta brought \$12,500 an average of \$1,400 being more than at the famed sale of Sir Clifford Sifton's horses a year ago.

During the season of 1912, when Joe Patchen II was sweeping everything before him on the Grand Circuit, it looked as if he would go into Winter quarters with an unbeaten record. This was also the wish of Rod McKenzie, his owner, and driver Fleming had orders to drive for every heat. However, one day at Fort Erie, another Canadian horse took the measure of the "Big Train," it being Knight Onwardo driven by Nat Ray the Toronto boy. This was the biggest killing that was made on the Grand Circuit that season. The Knight Onwardo connections cleaned up handsomely, while naturally Rod McKenzie was very much chagrined over the defeat of his crack.

Frank Boutillier, the Halifax trainer is driving a ten-month-old filly by Benares, dam Orphan Girl, which already shows a lot of speed and knows nothing but trot.

Scott Locke of Concord, N. H., who spent the winter at Macon, Ga., has shipped Ollie Watts, Native Emperor and Frank Albert, the three trotters he had with him, to Dover, N. H.

Lon McDonald has one of the most promising of the pacing stake candidates in Miss Harris M., 2:07 1/2. She raced a mile in 2:04 1/2 last summer as a three-year-old.

Miss Vesta Stibbs, of Lebanon, Ohio, not only breeds horses, but she also is the champion reinswoman of the Buckeye State. Her Orphan Boy, 2:22 1/2, with whom she was only one time "out of the money" last year, was broken, trained and driven in all his races by Miss Stibbs. At one race meeting last year she acted as timer and at another she was one of the judges.

Louis G. Najac of Providence has bought of Charles P. Mason the chestnut stallion Mendo Axworthy, 2:26 1/2, son of the great Axworthy 2:16 1/2, and Esperita by Mendocino, 2:19 1/2. In 1914 he held the speedway record in Providence as trotter of 1:08 1/2 over the half-mile course. He will be shipped by way of Halifax to the Maritime Provinces, where he will be a member of James D. Keith's stable at Stellarton, N. S. His son Lou Worthy, now 4 years old, worked a mile last fall over a twice-around in 2:15.—Boston Globe.

Joe Patchen II (2:03 1/2), who in 1912 was called the "Big Train from Canada," and who swept the Grand Circuit of every stake but one, is again being prepared for the big show after a year's absence. Joe Patchen II was bred in Ontario, and won his first race at the Toronto Exhibition track. T. Hodgins, of Orilla, sold him for a large sum to Rod McKenzie, of Winnipeg, and the latter never regretted the purchase. During his four months campaign four years ago he won approximately \$27,000 and last year he held the record for a winning pace, when Hal Boy established a new mark.

King George's Bakardo colt, Sir Dighton, made a dead heat with Major McCalmont's Roi d'Ecosse in the Craven Stakes at the Newmarket-Craven meeting this month, with Lord Derby's Phalaris, the even money favorite third. The Craven is looked on as a sort of trial for the Two Thousand Guineas, in which all three of the placed horses are engaged. The King's colt was receiving twelve pounds each from Roi d'Ecosse and Phalaris. In a maiden two-year-old race on the same day, the King was represented by a colt called Lucknow, by Minory-Amphora. He finished second in a field of twelve starters.

Purses and stakes aggregating \$42,000 are offered horses on the New York State Fair Commission at the meeting of the Grand Circuit in Syracuse next September. The stake events are as follows: 2:08 trot—The Empire State; purse, \$10,000. 2:11 pace—The Karnivals; \$5,000. 2:24 trot—The Kah-Noo-No.; \$2,000. 2:07 pace—The Chamber of Commerce \$2,000. 2:20 trot—The Governor's \$2,000. 2:17 pace—The Syracuse; \$2,000. 2:15 trot—The Devereaux; \$2,000. All these events will be under the three-halt plan. The program will include seven colt races for two and three year olds and in these events the purses aggregate \$15,000.

The Gleaner announces that Frederickton's racing programme for the meeting on July 11th, 12th and 13th will likely undergo some changes from that at first decided upon. The changes will be made in the stakes, the nominations in which closed on April 25th. Secretary Farrell has received a number of entries for the various stakes, however, the 2:30 pace having proved very popular. He has received requests from horsemen in the maritime provinces, Maine and Quebec, that the association change the 2:16 trot stake to a 2:19 trot or a 2:18 trot and there is some likelihood of this change being made in the programme. The 2:30 trot, 2:19 pace and 2:30 pace have received their share of entries, however, and the directors of the association are confident of a successful meeting.
