Rural Voters Will Decide Elections In Saskatchewan

REGINA, Sask., June 4—Resting from toll for a day on June 6, the farmers of Saskatchewan will go to the polls to name the ruler of the province's politics for the next four years. City dwellers, too, in Canada's greatest wheat-province, will mark their ballots—but the farm vote will make the decision.

Only seven of the 63 seats in the Saskatchewan Legislature are dominated by civic voters. Regina, Moose Jaw and Saskatoon return two members each to the Regina House, and Prince Albert names the seventh representative of a city population. Rural districts hold the power of the majority over virtually all the other communities in the province.

Only 13 per cent. of the province's population resides in cities of any size, census figures indicate. Saskatchewan's population in 1926 was 820,738, and only 109,556 persons lived in the cities of Regina, Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, North Battleford, Prince Albert, Swift Current, and Weyburn.

In the smaller towns and villages of the province and on farms, dotted far and wide over fertile land, reside the remainder of the province's population, Saskatchewan, which produces two thirds of the wheat of Canada, is by far the most rural province of the Dominion.

Voters' lists have increased in the cities, it is indicated, but the larger number of civic votes will fail to make any alteration in the number of seats under the ballot-control of the country-dweller. In Regina, the province's capital, 28,000 voters are eligible to cast their votes on June 6 in comparison to 16,000 registered voters of whom 14,000 balloted in 1925.

25 PER CENT FOREIGN BORN.

Almost 25 per cent. of the province's population, according to the census figures of 1926, were born outside the British Empire—and 60 per cent. of the foreign-born total were natives of Europe. The bulk of the other foreign-born folk were natives of the United States.

Even thirty per cent. of the province's Canadian-born population were recorded as having foreign parents and an added ten per cent. were listed as having one foreign parent. The vast intermingling of other nationalities to render Saskatchewan the melting-pot of Canada, makes the province's voting reflex one dependent of many circumstances.

Since 1905, when the province entered into existence, Liberal governments have held uninterrupted sway, and at dissolution this year, the regime of Premier James G. Gardiner held 51 of 63 seats in the House. This election, however, promises to bring out the most concerted opposition to the Government ever exerted in Saskatchewan.

No matter what platforms are placed before the people, no matter who stands as candidates, it is certain that those policies and those contestants will be victorious, which appeal most to the two prominent divisions of Saskatchewan's opinion—the farmer and the foreign-born vote.

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., June 4.—In celebration of the birthday of His Majesty King George V. Their Excellencies the Governor-General and the Viscountess Willingdon entertained at the annual garden party yesterday afternoon at government house. Attended by 3,000 people, the event proved to be as enjoyable as that of former years. Much regret was expressed at the unavoidable absence of Her Excellency, who is confined to her room with influenza.

Despite the dull, coolish weather, the grounds at Rideau Hall were more than usually attractive. The lovely wide sweep of lawn dotted with flower beds of vivid color and handsome shade trees presented a very pleasing appearance. Tulips in bright yellows, soft mauve tones and bright scarlet gave a riot of lovely colors and pansies in deep purple and pale yellows formed a demure border for flower beds throughout the grounds. The lights were particularly effective in all the soft shades of mauve, Her Excellency's favorite color.

His Excellency received on the lawn, Captain R. S. Streetfield and Mr. E. C. Miville announcing each guest. Brigadier-General C. H. MacLaren and Colonel L. R. Lafleche, honorary aides, stood immediately behind the receiving line. The band of the Royal Canadian Artillery played an enjoyable program throughout the afternoon. A feature was the singing of Mr. Harvey Eustace Keyes' quartette from Montreal. The two ladies and two gentlemen singers were quaintly attired in the velvets and brocades of court days.

The whole lower floor of Rideau Hall was thrown open to the guests. Tea was served in the racquet court and in the stately ball room. The long buffet tea tables were adorned with handsome silver ornaments and pretty miniature rose trees in pale pink and yellow. In the ballroom, tall vases of deep purple and pale pink feathery blossoms were used on the tables. Many of the guests remained indoors most of the afternoon wandering around at will.

Death Of Sir John M. Gibson

(Special to the Guardian)

HAMILTON, Ont., June 4—A man of manifold talents, who left his impress on the Times, Major-General Hon. Sir John M. Gibson, M. A., Lt. D. Lt. E. K. C. C. M. G. former Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario and an outstanding Canadian, died this afternoon at "Ravenscliff," his home about 3.30 o'clock. His death came as a shock. He had not been in his usual good health for the past several weeks, but his condition appeared to improve during the last few days. Shortly after luncheon this afternoon, however, he suffered a fainting spell. Dr. J. H. Mullin, his physician, was called but Sir John sank without rallying.

Sir John was 87 years of age on his last birthday, Jan 1. In the death of Sir John, Hamilton loses her best known citizen and Canada a man who was a distinguished patriot, and helped in no small way to mould its development along philanthropic, educational, financial and military lines. From a log school house in Peel County he had scaled the heights and been honored by three British sovereigns—Victoria, Edward and George, yet through it all his love for simplicity was perhaps his strongest trait, and his great fundamental humanity was always replenished by a kind heart.

He was a scholar of rare attainments, a barrister, a marksman, a soldier, educationalist, industrialist, financier, statesman, mason and strong church supporter—and in all these things he excelled and was a leader. He was Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario from 1908 to 1914, and was knighted in 1912.

FURTHER ESTIMATES TABLED IN HOUSE

OTTAWA, June 3—(C. P.)—Supplementary estimates of \$12,609,500 were tabled in the House of Commons tonight by Hon. James A. Robb, Minister of Finance. General supplementary estimates tabled last year amounted to \$10,883,000. The total of the supplementaries during the present year is consequently larger by over \$2,000,000. But this year there is an appropriation of \$4,200,000 to complete reparation payments, \$221,500 for deficits on the eastern lines of the Canadian National Railways, as required by provisions of the Maritime Freight Rates Act, and \$750,000 for a loan to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine.

The general supplementaries this year amount to \$7,438,000 as compared with last year's \$10,583,000. Among the larger items in this year's supplementaries are: \$600,000 for the purchase of lands and commencement of construction of certain penitentiary buildings. \$500,000 additional for health of animals branch. \$100,000 for world's grain congress. \$250,000 additional for Royal Canadian Air Force. \$315,000 additional for Civil air operations. \$200,000 for new second departmental building, Ottawa. \$250,000 for Sorel harbor works. \$800,000 subsidy for steamship service with Antipodes. \$400,000 for construction of steamers for hydrographic surveys. \$100,000 for cable ship. \$205,000 for icebreaker for Hudson Straits, largely revote. \$440,000 for icebreaker for St. Lawrence, largely revote. \$250,000 for movement of coal from Alberta and Maritimes to central provinces. \$160,000 for railway mail clerks. \$100,000 for Winnipeg postal employees—authorized by legislation—but vote required to put into effect. \$280,000 is to take care of Governor-General's warrants issued last year. \$109,000 is to cover unprovided items as reported by Auditor-General in usual way.

There are further appropriations for harbors and rivers. The amounts provided, by provinces, are as follows: Nova Scotia, \$70,100; Prince Edward Island, \$8,000; New Brunswick, \$13,000; Quebec, \$225,725; Ontario, \$315,200; Manitoba, \$13,300; British Columbia, \$43,300. Under the heading of "miscellaneous" there is an appropriation of \$46,873 to provide a further sum required toward defraying the expenses of the Empire Parliamentary Association's visit to Canada. There is a vote of \$10,000 as a grant to aid in the construction of a monument to Sir Louis H. Lafontaine. The department of national revenue votes include an amount of \$10,000 to provide for payments to Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon, Dilworthy, Guilfoyle and Nash for services in connection with sales tax investigation arising from reports of the special parliamentary committee and the Royal commission on customs.
