The Illustrated London News of January 22 publishes a fine portrait of Eugene Chen, Foreign Minister of the Nationalist Government in China. It will be recalled that at a recent lecture in the Caledonian Club series the statement was made that Mr. Chen was born in Trinidad and, when a young man, had been a student under Rev. Dr. Coffin, Principal of the Trinidad Presbyterian College, who is spending the present winter in Charlottetown. The Illustrated London News, gives the following legend under the portrait:

The "brain of the Westernized Cantonese Regime at Hankow; Mr. Eugene Chen, the Foreign Minister of the Nationalist Government in China.

Mr. Eugene Chen, who recently discussed the situation at Hankow with Mr. O'Malley, Counselor of the British Legation at Peking, represents a new type of Westernized Chinese revolutionary. "Daily Mail" correspondent at Hankow writes: Mr. Chen has nothing, Chinese about him, unless it be a slight cast of countenance, which is by no means convincing. He was born in Trinidad, and at the time was an anti-British nationalist. His command of English is well-nigh perfect. Mr. Chen wears white spats below his carefully creased trousers. He is a credit to his London tailor. He quotes Kipling and Hardy with easy confidence. His brain is undoubtedly the ablest of any at the moment. Canton's Russian tutor, Mr. Chen's daughter, fresh from an American university, wears the latest Paris fashions.

A feature of the domestic trade during the last week was the demand for Canadian western oats on spot and sales of 130,000 bushels of No. 3, C. W. and No. 1, feeds were made on terms ex store. The trade on Saturday was quiet in all lines and prices ruled steady. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was inactive but values were well maintained. Prices for all lines of millfeed were well maintained under a good demand. Business in standard grades of rolled oats was quiet but prices were steady. The egg market was moderately active and steady. The receipts were 725 cases. The demand for butter showed some improvement Saturday and a moderate trade was done at unchanged prices. No 1 pasteurized was quoted at 41 1/2 c per pound. The receipts were 31 packages. The cheese market was again dull but prices were unchanged.
