SMALL BLAZE — S'Side Firemen were called out shortly after ten o'clock on Sunday morning for a fire at the Seaman House, now owned by Mrs. Wm. Mann. Slight damage was done to the roof. It was thought the fire started round the flue. The firemen quickly had it under control.

FIRE MARSHAL GIVES ADDRESS — Mr. Charles A. Beer, fire marshal, gave an address in Summerside on Friday evening. He gave an informative address on fire watching in air raids. He urged the people of Summerside to prepare themselves for any such emergency, and to see that they had ample fire equipment should the need arise. He showed two films of a fire which occurred in the city of London, Ontario, and showed what went on while an air raid was actually on; the duty of fire watchers, air raid wardens, nurses and the fire department. He illustrated that the general public could do to fight incendiary bombs. These could be very well taken care of by the fire department. He was carefully carried out. Fire Marshal Beer spoke to a gathering of firemen, and A. R. P. workers and the general public at the High School.

SUCCESSFUL SALVAGE CAMPAIGN — The Salvage Campaign which opened on Saturday in Summerside was a splendid response by the public to the appeal for salvage declared Mr. O. B. Morris, chairman of the Salvage Campaign in S'Side on Monday. He said that the salvage had not been gathered up again, and the trucks would be out again on Tuesday. At the same time, he said that a variety of useful material which was eagerly gathered up by the Boy Scouts and other boys who helped the committee in their task. The committee are very grateful. 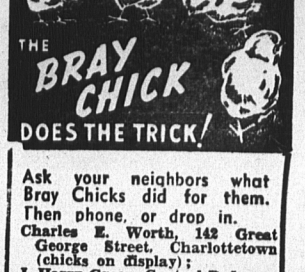

Dickson said he counted 11 bodies in five blocks of Main street. He saw about 80 persons he believed seriously wounded and 50 others less seriously hurt.

The multi-million dollar Oklahoma ordinance works south of here escaped serious damage, and 4 main street with a freakish destructive hand, Dickson said.
