Mowers Scores Fifth Shutout Desbiens sparked Apps goal gives As Wings Whip Leafs 3-0 Miners in Cape Breton League Leafs 4-3 win

DETROIT, Feb. 22 (CP)—Detroit Red Wings ended a five-game winning streak by Toronto Maple Leafs with a 3-0 National Hockey League victory tonight before 10,000 spectators for goalie Johnny Mowers' fifth shutout of the season, and second in three games. The triumph gave Detroit sole possession of fifth place over the Brooklyn Americans.

Detroit got one goal in the first period and two more in the second of a hard checking game, but Syd Howe's tally in the eleventh minute was ample margin for Mowers, who in three successive Detroit victories has yielded one goal, Sid Abel and Mud Bruneteau scored six minutes apart in the second period.

DETROIT, Feb. 22 (CP)—Syl Apps got his 100th goal here Saturday night and it is doubtful if any that preceded it in his six years' campaigning in the National Hockey League gave the quiet captain of the Toronto Maple Leafs as much satisfaction.

The goal came in the last 20 seconds of play and broke up a tough tussle with Brooklyn's bustling Americans, the Leafs winning 4-3. The victory—Toronto's fifth straight—moved the Leafs from a second-place desecration with Boston into a first-place tie with New York Rangers.

Aside from Apps' dramatic tally, the tight-knit contest had for the 10,529 fans present one other feature—the number of penalties.

Dished out by Referee Mel Harwood making his first appearance on Toronto ice, altogether there were 24—the major, the other feature.

Brooklyn's defence corps supplied all the goals for the visitors, Pat Egan, Wilf Field and Cowboy Tommy Anderson rapping them home in that order.

Apps had just been thwarted on a great play by goalie Charlie Reardon when he finally hit pay dirt. There was a face off to the side of the Brooklyn net and in the ensuing tangle Apps took a swipe at the puck as it was falling, the rubber sliding through a group of skates into the far side of the net.

McCreedy got his tally when he deflected Buck McDonald's long shot into the net. Schirmer scored when his hard shot slipped through Reardon's hand and rolled down the boards into the goal.

Davidson scored on a breakaway when his club was short-handed.

Egan just returned from serving a penalty when his goal opened the scoring at 39 seconds of the second period.

Field swept around McDonald to hammer home a backhand shot for his goal and Anderson rapped in the rebound of Egan's shot for the last of the Americans' tallies.

Toe Blake paces Royals win twice Canucks to win Over weekend

MONTREAL, Feb. 22 (CP)—Montreal Royals handed Ottawa Senators their second straight loss here today when they whipped the Capital City squad 4-1 in the opening half of the last Sunday game.

Fresh from their 3-3 victory over Chicago Black Hawks here Saturday night, a crowd of 8,537 saw the same.

Desperately in need of the victory to keep their playoff hopes alive, Habitants went out for goals early in the game and took a 3-0 lead before Chicago replied with two quick goals. But with seconds of the first period remaining, little Pete Morin scored what proved to be the clincher when he deflected Charlie Sands' shot past goalie Sam Lo Presti during a Canadian power attack.

Bob Carre, who looked good in his return to the Hawks lineup after a pair of weeks with injuries for the past few weeks scored the third Chicago goal at 1:29 of the middle frame. From there on, however, Canadiens put up a formidable defence with Terry Reardon adding another goal in the third period.

Veteran Toe Blake started Canadiens on their way when he scored the 99th and 100th goals of his career on a pair of neat plays. Then Ray Gettiffe counted to give Canadiens their third tally within the space of little more than two minutes.

Bentley brothers, Max and Doug, along with newcomer Audley Tuten, combined to score two goals in the minute for Hawks, while Doug Bentley getting the first and Tuten the second.

Although beaten five times, Lo Presti was brilliant in fending the Canadiens count down. Three and again Habitants were in alone on him only to be beaten and on one occasion he out-guessed three Ottawians who had him at their mercy.

Canadiens lost the services of Charlie Sands and Morin for most of the third period. The former suffered a charlie horse in his left leg which checked heavily while Morin received a slight concussion when he was bodied to the ice during a melee in front of the Hawks cage.

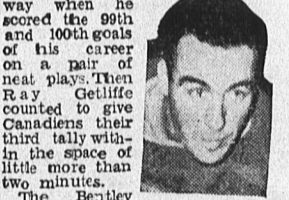

Young Rookie Playing First Pro Game Scores Winner Rangers Down Chicago 3-2

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—Young Hubert Macey, playing in the first professional hockey game of his life, tonight scored the winning goal as New York Rangers defeated Chicago Black Hawks 3-2 to snap their losing streak at four straight and regain sole possession of first place in the National Hockey League standings.

Macey, high-scoring left winger this season with New York Rangers of the Eastern United States Amateur Hockey League and last year a member of Winnipeg's junior champions of Canada, was signed to a professional contract last Friday to replace the injured Alfie Pike.

Tonight, late in the third period he grabbed the spotlight by picking home the puck after his line mates, Neil Colville and Alex Shlubby, had drawn goalie Sam Lo Presti out of position.

The Hawks jumped into a two-goal lead in the first period, on goals by Max Bentley and Bobby Carre, and were still leading 2-1 at the end of the second period following Neil Colville's quick conversion of a pass by Shlubby.

But the New Yorkers tied the count in the third, Phil Watson tipping the puck past Lo Presti's leg as the goalie went down.
