#### CLEANING SILVERWARE

When you have a little amount of flat silver to be cleaned, try this method: Fill an aluminum kettle (it must be aluminum) with boiling water. To one quart of the water add one tablespoon baking soda and one of salt. Immerse the silver in this solution being sure each piece comes in contact with the aluminum. Boil for a couple of minutes, rinse in very hot water and polish with a soft cloth.

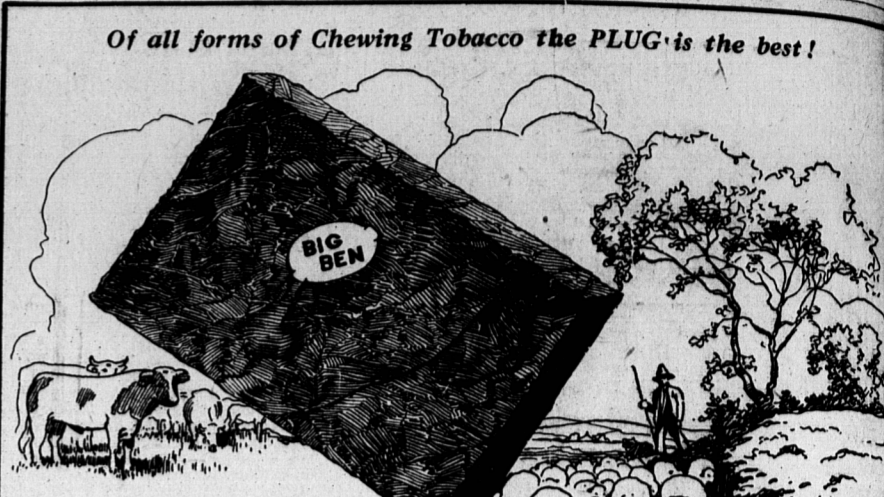
