**RECOVERED.**—Mr. L. J. Acorne, Prince Edward Islander who when travelling through New Brunswick on his way home from the United States for a visit, was washed out of an auto against the Model Farm highway bridge in a deluge, has left for his home in the sister province quite recovered from his extraordinary injuries, says the Saint John Times. Mr. Acorne's jaw was fractured in two places, teeth loosened and some knocked out. He also sustained a fracture of the skull and a broken leg. His recovery is considered a high tribute to the surgical skill and ingenuity of the General Public Hospital surgeons, including a dental surgeon, and to careful nursing. The young man's parents have joined with him in grateful praise. For several days during his unconsciousness Mr. Acorne's case was looked upon as hopeless.

### Market For Hogs In Mid Summer

The attention of Prince Edward Island hog raisers is being directed to the market which exists for live hogs during the months of mid-summer. As a general rule our farmers do not plan to have hogs ready for market during these months but prefer to confine their offerings to the cooler seasons only. It is this tendency on the part of hog raisers generally which is one of the factors responsible for the seasonal and oftentimes painful fluctuation in hog prices.

The farmer who has hogs for sale in July and August can, we are informed, find a ready market for them at prices ranging sufficiently higher than at other seasons to attract attention consequent upon farrowing in the cold weather and summer feeding.

In connection with this matter we would refer our readers to the advertisement which has been appearing in this paper, announcing a competition for pigs farrowed in the winter and ready for sale in July. We think that the swine raiser of this Province, who can do so, might beneficially enter this competition and so establish, as soon as possible, a supply of live hogs at seasons of the year.

Farmers who are interested in this important question are advised to get in touch with the Department of Agriculture, where full information as to marketing conditions in general and this competition in particular can be secured.

Foster, one of the Canadian representatives to the League of Nations Assembly, questioned here today as to a rumor that a British Dominion was seeking one of the five newly created non permanent seats in the Council of the League of Nations, said Canada was not a candidate for one of five seats in question.

### 4 Trainmen Killed In C. P. R. Wreck

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 7.—Four trainmen were killed and a fifth was slightly injured when a heavily loaded freight train on the Kettle Valley Branch, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was derailed on the bridge at Jessica, 110 miles east of Vancouver at 10 o'clock Sunday morning, and crashed into the canyon, 100 feet below. Fire later destroyed the bridge and partially burned 26 cars, which were precipitated into the chasm.

### Eight Persons Killed In Railway Accident

CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Eight persons were reported killed last night when a Chicago northwestern passenger train from Madison, Wis., ploughed into another Chicago northwestern train from Barrington, Illinois, which was discharging passengers at the Cortland Street suburban station. Both trains were made up of wooden coaches and four or five of those of the train struck were said to have been telescoped. The wreckage immediately caught fire. It was estimated that 150 persons were injured. Virtually all of those believed to have been killed were in the last two coaches which were telescoped.
