ears, and he has failed to ascertain that all this ancient history has been thoroughly thrashed out both in the House and before the electorate, and that all these statements he has put forward have been passed upon by the people, and the verdict of the people, after listening to them, was that they did not believe them, but believed that the financial condition of the province was as we have stated it to be.

My friend has referred to a number of public utilities. He speaks of the public roads, and it would seem to me, to judge from his statements, that the only thing he saw when travelling along the roads was alleged multiplicity of roadmaster. He seems to have overlooked the large number of steel bridges constructed by the late Government, and has failed to see the large number of improvements. He has forgotten the way in which statute labor has been performed on all our public roads under our present system, whereby the labor has been performed by those most interested who have done their work intelligently and with apparent and proved results.

With respect to roads and public works, some excuse might be made for the inaccuracy of his statements because he is a professional man, and is not competent to judge of those things; but he makes the statement, it which I am surprised, that the schools have been carelessly neglected by the present Government, and he would lead us to believe that we have not done nearly as well as the Liberals during their term of office. He knows better than that. He knows that the average attendance is far better, and if he does not know it he can easily ascertain it. We have not got the number of schools opened for political purposes as formerly. More than that, he knows we have saved the parents immense sums of money by placing within their reach school books at small cost. He knows that the teachers are better paid, and we have improved the system of paying the teachers as far as the advance of the province would allow; while under the past Government they took away the small bonus that existed in the way of supplement and did not increase the pay in any respect.

In respect to Falconwood, he made the statement that we have not kept this institution up as well as his party did, and he asks us to believe that on his say-so. He has not shown that on facts. Now if we look at the records we will find that the percentage of cures during the past year was greater than for many years past, and I may say that during the past year I happened to be in Court at the time the Grand Jury received the charge from the Judge, and they were instructed very specifically and impressively that it was necessary for them to look most carefully into the condition of Falconwood; and the foreman of the Grand Jury on that occasion—a Liberal—returned with a highly favorable report.

MR. SAUNDERS: On one visit could they form an opinion of the true state of affairs?

MR. STEWART: They could form a better opinion than my friend who never visited the institution at all. (Applause.) And the report of the Grand Jury is a most favorable one. They reported the institution to be in splendid condition. Those are the facts, and you can place them against my friend's unsupported statements.

With regard to agriculture, I will not touch on this subject. I don't think the member has said anything worth touching upon.

I would refer to the statement made by the Leader of the Opposition, who criticized the action of the Government in leasing the present premises of the Lieutenant Governor for a rental of \$1200 a year. That criticism is very smart. It is not of the helpful kind we have heard mentioned, and it is not fair and honest but political criticism which should not be tolerated in these times, and more especially with respect to the subject with which it deals. Is the hon. gentleman aware of the fact that for the past twenty years the average cost of the upkeep of the Government House has been \$125 a year, almost the whole amount of the rent paid, and then we had to pay insurance besides? Is he aware of that? In this case we have rented these premises, which consist of 8 acres of ground, two residences, barns, etc. for \$1200, and that including insurance, taxes and everything, free and the building kept up and furnished. The Leader of the Opposition speaks of patriotism, but he speaks in general terms. His preachings patriotism, but when it comes to any specific matter and any specific act in which this province has attempted to render any assistance in any respect, the Leader of the Opposition turns round at once and cries: "It should have been left to the Dominion Government. We had no right to do it; it is a matter for the Dominion Government." He knows that

the Dominion Government was not obliged to do this. The obligation was on our side. The men who are to be placed in the convalescent home are our boys coming home wounded. Further than that, the Dominion Government is spending thousands of dollars on the construction of these buildings, money all spent among our own laborers, and in the face of all this, the Leader of the Opposition will spend the time of the House criticising a small expenditure of \$1200 a year to pay rental for a house for His Honor, to whose splendid patriotic action I have already referred. If the Leader of the Opposition had power, I wonder what he would have done for His Honor in that respect? Would he have had him wait on the street while he haggled with the Dominion Government as to where he should reside or who would pay the rent? I did not intend to speak, but I felt it my duty to correct a few of the statements made by the hon. member.

The debate was concluded at 12.20 p.m. and the House went into Committee of the whole to consider the estimate. House adjourned shortly before 1 o'clock.

Provincial Legislature,

TUESDAY, APRIL 23rd., 1918.

In the Legislature this morning Mr. Bell rose to a question of privilege in regard to an editorial in the "Guardian" in which it was stated that he and Mr. McLean had opposed the War and Health Tax while on the third reading they voted for it. He said it was true he and Mr. McLean opposed the measure on the second reading; but as to the third reading, he said, no vote was actually taken or recorded, and it was unfair for the "Guardian" to refer to the matter in the way in which it had done.

THE PREMIER: The hon. gentleman might state his objection, but he must not make it the foundation for a speech.

Mr. Bell went on to deal with the statement that he strongly concurred on the home projects movement inaugurated some years ago. It was not the Home Projects Movement which he had discussed, he said; but the question that was under discussion was to try to inaugurate a war movement.

THE PREMIER here rose to a point of order. The question of privilege, he pointed out, must be something that reflected materially on the hon. gentleman. If the newspaper had stated something that was entirely against Parliamentary usage he might reasonably discuss it.

THE SPEAKER: When the member's honour is attacked he has a right to object.

MR. BELL: A misreport, a member has a right to object to. The paper goes on to say that Mr. Dennis and Mr. Saunders denounced it as absurdly untrue.

THE PREMIER: Well, isn't it all true?

MR. BELL: A misreport a member I want to deny. (Laughter.) So far as Mr. Dennis is concerned the statement is absolutely and essentially untrue.

MR. JOHNSTON also rose to a question of privilege. He said that the "Guardian" in its report of the discussion on the Connolly Bill, had reported him as having said there was an Irish Catholic population of 25,000 in the province. "This statement in the Guardian," he said, "looks like a deliberate misstatement due intentionally for a purpose, because out of the Guardian report arose a newspaper controversy and letters.

THE PREMIER: In justice to the young man who reports, I don't think the hon. member is justified in saying it was deliberate. I don't think it is right to attack a reporter in this House in this manner.

MR. JOHNSTON: I am not imputing any motives to the reporter. I am satisfied he is doing honest work in the House; but I unhesitatingly impute motives to those who are in the Sanctum Sanctorum of the Guardian.
