P. E. I. Health Survey Program Accepted - Prince Edward Island's proposed health survey program has been accepted by the Federal Department of Health and the first cheque, ten percent of the \$15,000 made available for survey purposes, has already been received. Hon. A. W. Matheson, Provincial Minister of Health and Welfare stated yesterday on return from attending a health conference at Ottawa, while in Ottawa Mr. Matheson met the Ministers of Health for the other Maritime Provinces and discussed with them the possibility of using Federal health grants jointly in some cases.

The provincial health survey which was set up early this summer under the chairmanship of Dr. J. Harold Shaw, has been working ever since and their preliminary report was the second to reach Ottawa. Only Ontario's got there ahead of P. E. Island's and this province's report is already in the mails when the Ontario report was received.

The \$15,000 grant is a non-recurring one and is for survey purposes only. Other much larger grants are available for various phases of health work as soon as the Federal Government's all-year health plan goes into operation.

The grants available to this province for instance are \$33,000 for public health, \$47,000 for tuberculosis, \$53,000 for mental health, \$7,000 for venereal disease, a like amount for crippled children, \$25,000 for cancer, \$97,000 for hospital construction, and \$7,000 for professional training.

The Provincial Government must put up matching amounts in the cases of cancer, hospital construction and venereal disease but there is no such regulation regarding the other grants.

Visit To Ch'town Of H.M.C.S. Swansea

The H.M.C.S. Swansea, a River class Frigate of 2,200 tons, docked at the Marine wharf at 10 o'clock yesterday morning on a three-day goodwill visit to Charlottetown.

Lieutenant E. W. Timbrell, D.S.C., R.C.N., of Vancouver and Halifax in command of the Swansea, paid his official calls of welcome yesterday morning to His Honor Lt.-Governor J. A. Bernard, Premier J. Walter Jones and Mayor B. Earle MacDonald.

During yesterday afternoon, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, accompanied by his aide, Lieutenant Robert MacMillan, D.S.C., and Premier J. Walter Jones, accompanied by Attorney General F. A. Large, paid a return visit to Lieutenant Timbrell aboard ship.

The Swansea, with a complement of 18 officers and 110 men, is at present engaged in training reserve personnel of the Royal Canadian Navy.

Lt. Timbrell was born in Devonshire, England, and joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1937, and was sent to England where he trained with the British Navy until 1940. He was in command of his first ship, the H.M.S. Lanthorn, during the evacuation of Dunkirk, and was decorated with the D.S.C. by His Majesty the King for "meritorious service" in September of the same year. He then took command of the Canadian destroyer "Margaret," which was sunk two weeks later in a convoy collision. He was picked up floating on a raft some six hours later.

Since that time Lt. Timbrell served aboard other Canadian destroyers, and in 1944, while serving aboard the H.M.C.S. Ottawa, was mentioned in dispatches for sinking three German U-boats. He took command of the Swansea in March of this year.
