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Heavy Fire Loss Yesterday At Victoria

A fire which yesterday afternoon destroyed the warehouse of Mr. Peter McEachern in Victoria and the nearby residence of Mr. Earl Lord was finally brought under control by the combined efforts of the Victoria and Craupud fire brigades.

In answer to a call for help the Charlottetown Fire Department sent out a pumper and several firemen. They only remained a short time as the local brigades had the fire well in hand when the City equipment arrived.

Mr. McEachern's loss included the destruction of his office records files on which were recorded bills approximating \$6,000, considerable farm machinery for which he was agent, and a motor truck.

Mrs. Lord was ill in bed but was removed to a place of safety, before the fire reached the dwelling. Most of the furniture was also removed from the house.

The estimated property loss is believed to be in excess of \$10,000. The cause of the fire is unknown.

There were many "angry and frustrated people" in Canada today, particularly among the farming population.

"No matter what Province you go into in this country," he said, "there is a terrible state of confusion among farmers."

The Government should assist the industry by opening the United States market to Canadian cattle and other farm products.

Mr. Gillis said the whole economy of this country so far as the producer and the consumer was concerned was "completely out of control."

He said the members should "re-arrange" their thinking to conform with conditions of the day. There was a showdown in the world between two economic systems.

He said he would vote for the resolution but he was "not satisfied with the way in which the Government had used its powers since the war ended. Controls which had been abandoned should be re-imposed."

Mr. Gillis said the C.C.F. party did not want monopolies in Canada to fix the price controls they wished to have. Today Swift Canadian and Canada Packers were fixing the prices for farmers products.

The price fixing should be done by boards under the Minister of Agriculture.

He did not think it was possible to have price controls without a subsidy arrangement. It was no use talking about controls without getting the Government's views of the subsidy question.

He said Labor had made it clear that it realized that wages could not skyrocket without affecting the cost-of-living.

He did not think there should be a disarming vote in telling the Government to re-impose the controls enforced in wartime.

He felt the excess profits tax should be extended beyond Dec. 31. The rate of profit allowed industry should be fixed by Government. If the industry was not satisfied with the rate fixed it could take its capital elsewhere, to the United States, for instance.

Mr. Caouette said Solon Low, Social Credit leader, had suggested recently that a loan of \$25,000,000 be raised among the Canadian people to supply Britain with the money needed to buy Canadian products.

Mr. Caouette, who sits with the Social Credit Party, said he had told Mr. Low that he could not support the suggestion and he knew the people of Quebec would oppose it as well.

Instead of billions for Britain Canadians wanted billions to meet their needs at home in building up their own country.

In disagreeing with Mr. Low, Mr. Caouette said he wished to make it clear he was not bound by any political party but only by the demands of his electors.
