Canadian Horses For Bermuda

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., June 16. — A new departure marking the ever closer trade relationship between Canada and the West Indies was brought to light at the Toronto Hunt Club horse show last night by Lieut. Col. T. C. Evans, district veterinary officer of Military District No. 2, who told of having shipped an order of four Canadian horses for the British forces in Bermuda yesterday.

The department of National Defence at Ottawa," said Col. Evans, was requested by the Imperial Government to buy four horses for the British forces in Bermuda, where the Sutherland Highlanders are stationed. One was to be a combination horse for His Excellency the Governor of the Island. A second was to be an officer's charger, and the rest a matched team.

"This is a new departure since horses for the Island are usually bought in England." All four purchases were made in Ontario from farmers at Brampton, Cayuga and Burford. They were shipped yesterday on the Government steamship Canadian Fisher."

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., June 17. — Egg markets continued strong Saturday with prices holding firm.

TORONTO—The local egg situation is firm and unchanged. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 32-34, firsts 32-31, seconds 23-24.

MONTREAL—The local egg market is firm. It was reported today a car of B. C. eggs, at extras

31, firsts 29, F O B also a car of Ontario April extras and a car of April firsts have been sold at extras 37 1-2, firsts 35 1-2, F O B. Ontario shipping points, season storage paid.

VANCOUVER—Paying prices to producers here are extras 25-26, firsts 22-24, pullet extras 19-20.

HALIFAX—The local egg market is showing a stronger undertone with receipts light and demand good. Dealers are paying country shippers, delivered, extras 31, firsts 27, seconds 21.

MONTREAL, June 17. — Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here Saturday. There being little or no demand from foreign buyers but there was no improvement in the demand for cash. Grain in the spot market, and car lot prices for oats were again easier. The demand for spring and winter wheat grades of flour continued of a limited character but prices were firm. Prices for all lines of millfeed were well maintained under a moderate demand from local and United States buyers.

The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was quiet and prices were easy at the late decline. The consumptive demand for eggs continued good and the undertone to the market was steady. The receipts Saturday were 3,479 cases. The strength that has characterized the butter trade of late was again a feature on Saturday and prices were marked up a quarter cent per pound. The local and export trade in cheese was good and values were steady to a shade stronger. The re-
