**Child's Conference To Meet In Ottawa**

Next week there will be held in Ottawa a conference of very great significance to the people of Canada. It will not in all probability receive as much notice in the newspapers as will the mutual re-reminders of the political parties now seeking to gain the reins of government by every possible means. And yet the programme of the conference of the Canadian Council of Child Welfare is ground that to every forward looking Canadian must appear as essential in the sane development of our country. The subjects to be dealt with are Child Hygiene, Child Labour, Education and Recreation of Neglected, Dependent and Delinquent and Detective Children. A report will be made of what has been accomplished in the five years the Council has been in existence—five years of uphill work—for until now those engaged in the work have done so in time taken from other occupations and it is greatly to be hoped that one of the results of the publicity given to the present conference will be the engagement of a permanent secretary with a salary. Other phases of the work now underway by which already some hundreds on the island have benefited is the sending, (on application to Miss Wilson, Red Cross Society, Charlottetown), of letters to any expectant mother giving her either in French or English as required information during each month as to the necessary care that her child may be well born and her own health unimpaired. How many islanders know that our record is one of the worst in Canada for still births, infant and maternal mortality? During each year there has been a slight improvement owing probably to the advice and help given by the nurses of the Red Cross Society. In 1924 in Canada there were 35 stillbirths for 1000 confinements, the total number of maternal deaths was 939, the deaths of children under 1 year of age amounted to 12,382. This is at the rate of 140 per 1000 births, while New Zealand's rate is 44 per 1000. How much wiser we would be to pay out money to save our own native born children than to import children from immigration. Here is a subject completely ignored by our political parties. The Child Welfare Council has also taken up the question of the care of the immigrant child. Miss Charlotte Whitton whom many on this island will remember from her visit here some years ago on Social Service work, has taken a special interest in this question. Largely through the efforts of the Council the age of children allowed to be sent to Canada without their parents has been limited to that of 17 years. Insistent on proper supervision of the homes to which children are sent. Officials of the Council are in frequent touch with those of the League of Nations in respect to conditions under which children are sent to Canada and to the passing and enforcing of laws relating to children that Canada may be brought in line with the most enlightened countries of the world. A branch of the Council's work which cannot fail to appeal to every lover of children is the effort to bring to crippled and stunted children education and opportunities of happiness. It is interesting to note that in B. C. the Women's Institutes have taken a special interest in establishing free dental clinics for children and in raising a fund for crippled children. The Council has already published 17 pamphlets covering some of the questions which may be had on application by any member. Any one may become a member by paying \$1.00 to Miss Wilson of the Red Cross Society, Charlottetown. It is an easy way to become a factor in this promising work for Canadian childhood.

**Roll Call At Salvation Army**

A well attended and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Salvation Army Citadel on Monday evening. The meeting had been announced as a Soldiers Roll Call, only those whose names are on the roll being admitted.

Following the opening song and Bible reading the roll was called. Each soldier present answering to his name, by personal testimony. Some of those who joined in the early days were present, including Sergt. Major F. Renouf, who has put in over thirty years of faithful service.

In his address, Adjutant Davis, the corps officer, referred to the history of the corps, which he said, was famous throughout the Dominion as being credited with having sent over eighty of its members into the work as officers many of whom are still actively engaged in the work. Prominent among these is Lieut. Col. Wm. DesBrosses who is now Women's Social Secretary for the Canada East Territory. The Adjutant appealed for renewed zeal and effort for the keeping up of the Army's standards of life and service in the latter part of the meeting the Annual Harvest Festival effort was talked over and collection books were distributed to those present. The amount desired is the same as in previous years, and everyone seemed optimistic as to the results. It was decided to bring the effort to a close on Sunday, Oct. 11th, when Special Thanksgiving Services will be held with a great Auction Sale of Vegetables, fruits, etc., to be held on Monday, Oct. 12th, 8 p.m.

The meeting closed with the singing of one of General William Booth's famous compositions, "Lord Through the Blood of the Lamb who was slain. Cleansing for Me."
