ARTFUL MR. TARTE.

There is much regretful comment in the Opposition press over the fact that the Liberals in power have signally departed from the famous platform laid down in 1893 in so far as the tariff is concerned. The fact may as well be admitted and we have not seen it denied that the sort of tariff foreshadowed in the famous platform has not yet been given to the country. The platform denounced protection:

"We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the mass of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fall to afford any substantial relief from the burden under which the country labors. This issue we unhesitatingly accept, and upon it we await with the fullest confidence the verdict of the electors."

But it is to be observed that the anti-protection plank was but one of a number of planks in the famous platform. And it can hardly be claimed or asserted that the Liberals obtained power in 1893 because of their pledge to reform and lower the tariff. It is clear that but for the Manitoba school question, the loss of successive leaders by the Conservative party and the dissensions which were rampant in the Cabinet the Liberals would not have carried the election of 1896. The Conservative party may be said to have largely defeated itself. It is idle now to speculate upon what might have been, but it seems not improbable that if Sir Charles Tupper had succeeded in carrying the election of 1896, the oncoming of the prosperous times which followed might have enabled him to retain power until this day.

It being clear that the Liberal party did not obtain power by their previous low tariff policy, and there being some influential protectionists among the French wing of the party, it was but natural, however inconsistent that the anti-protection plank should be relegated to the back-ground. They learned that the people did not desire the abolition of protection and consequently they did not abolish it. The essential features of the protective tariff were retained but were qualified by the preference given to imports from the Mother Country. And it is safe to say that the Fielding tariff as it now is suits Canada as well as any scale of duties we have yet had. If it is hard for the Liberal leaders to defend it in presence of the platform of 1893, it is also

hard for the Conservatives to attack it, because it embodies the principle of protection. Generally speaking the present tariff is too high to suit the great mass of consumers and not high enough to suit the manufacturers. It is mainly too high for the people of the Maritime Provinces and of Manitoba and the Northwest, and at the same time too low to suit the manufacturing centres of Ontario and Quebec. The Manufacturers' Association has called for more protection. The Opposition leader, Mr. Borden, wants more protection. Whereupon the artful Mr. Tarte, comes to the front and shouts for protection louder than the Opposition leader. And Mr. Sifton, out on the breezy prairie amid the wheat sheaves, assures his farmer-constituents that the tariff is already too high, and if any change is made at all it must be reduced.

Let no man suppose that there is any root of personal bitterness springing up between Mr. Tarte and Mr. Sifton, such as might lead to blows or to the exclusion of one or the other from the Cabinet. They are playing the game and playing it well. The prairie farmers are pleased with Mr. Sifton. The manufacturers find Mr. Tarte all right. The wind which fills Mr. Borden's sails is the wind of protection. The artful Mr. Tarte intercepts this protective breeze and turns it to account as so much motive power. He believes in giving the people what they want. Railroads, harbor works, buildings, anything you want, gentlemen. Any kind of a tariff you want. All of which tends to keep the people amused and goodnatured. Artful politicians having the aids of power and patronage can do much as they please and say pretty much what they please to a prosperous people. As for the Cabinet as a whole we believe they are possessed of an ardent and earnest desire to hold on to power, and they seem likely to succeed in their endeavors for some time to come.

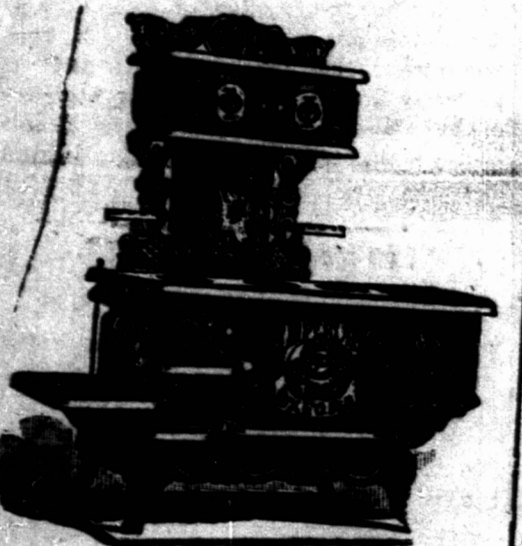
