## ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

(Continued)

The individuals in your feed lot should not only be good, but your group of steers, or feeders, should be as uniform as possible. An even lot of steers will always be more easily sold than a bunch of all sizes and shapes.

In the British cattle markets, for example, one of the first things a vendor of cattle does is to sort out his animals and divide them into groups that will be as uniform as possible. One inferior steer in a bunch of good ones will spoil the sale of the lot, and one good steer among a group of common ones will make the lot look better than it really are. Uniformity both as to size and quality is important in the bunch of steers you turn into your feed lot.

The trend, as has been stated, is all toward feeding younger and, consequently, lighter cattle. If it is possible to get weaned calves, of the range, these would seem to be the most desirable kind of feeders. Calves of this sort will add more pounds to their weight on less feed than older cattle. With many feeding at this age, the lean meat content of their bodies will be increased, and at the same time substantial deposits of fat will be made in this lean meat, thus producing a very desirable and marketable quality of beef.

At the present time perhaps the majority of calves are fairly well bred. High bred bulls are generally selected with much care, and some definite plan for cattle improvement has been followed up by most people with the result that calves are now uniformly good, and the task of selecting a group of good calves that will make desirable beef is an easy matter.

In feeding beef cattle we have to maintain the body heat, support the life of the animal, and add to its fatty tissue, that is, in the case of mature animals. We feed, however, a great many young and growing animals in which we can increase the lean meat content as we fatten them, therefore it becomes necessary to feed more protein to cattle of this kind.

The feeding of carbohydrates and fat will largely serve the purpose of fattening mature animals, with, of course, a low protein content, but with the younger animals, and particularly with calves, the protein content in a ration can be profitably increased.

## Uses Explosives To Induce Rain

DALLAS, Tex., May 1—Tex. Thornton, explosives expert who has bombed out stubborn oil wells as a series of blasts near here late today in an effort to coax rain from clouds overhanging this section of the "dust bowl." There were no conclusive results.

The explosives were fired on the ground because of the non-arrival of balloons, which Thornton planned to use in his experiment. Charges of T. N. T. and solidified nitroglycerin jelly were fired at 20-minute intervals. A few minutes after the first bomb was set off, the dust-laden wind had quieted and rain clouds seemed to range lower. Weather observers said the barometric pressure was dropping.

Thornton said he will send bomb-laden balloons into the clouds tomorrow and explode them with time fuses.

The explosives were purchased with funds raised by donations of citizens.

## U.S. Senate Curtails NRA Move

WASHINGTON, May 1—A sudden crystallization of Senate sentiment for curbing the moves of the National Recovery Administration (NRA) and extending its life only until next April, today pointed to the possibility of a major legislative defeat for President Roosevelt.

Over the objections of Mr. Roosevelt, who wanted a two-year extension, the Senate Finance Committee voted today to report a resolution for the brief continuance of the recovery law with modifications. Party chiefs immediately lined up their forces to put the resolution through quickly and without change.

Under the plan the present recovery law would be extended by a simple resolution merely continuing the present law until April 1, 1936, with price fixing and regulation of intra-state business eliminated. Price fixing would be permitted in natural resource industries for which codes now provide it.

Meanwhile, government attorneys—Stanley Reed of the Justice Department and Donald Richberg of NRA—prepared for the opening of crucial arguments before the Supreme Court tomorrow on the constitutionality of NRA. They filed a bulky brief with the court just before it closed this afternoon.

## Vatican May Protest To Germany

VATICAN CITY, May 1—Prelates said tonight the Holy See may protest to Germany against the alleged treatment of 2,000 young German Catholics as "political suspects."

Observators Romano, organ of the Vatican, earlier printed reports from Germany that the youths were treated as suspects when they returned home after receiving the blessing of Pope Pius.

The churchmen cautiously explained, however, that the protest is "a mere possibility" and not necessarily a probability.

The decision rests, of course, with the Pontiff and with Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State. The latter returned from Lourdes, France, tonight, and was expected to give the matter his immediate attention.

## Gang Linked In Robberies, Kidnapping

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 1—Investigators tonight sought to link the thugs who robbed a postal truck of \$29,000 in Fall River, Mass., last January with the disappearance of Justice Joseph F. Crater of the New York Supreme Court and a series of major robberies in the past few years.

The Lindbergh kidnaping was mentioned among these, but Federal officials would not say they were taking this possibility seriously.

They were, however, admittedly attempting to identify the gang with a \$200,000 jewel robbery at Housatonic, Mass., in July of 1934 and with the kidnaping and futile ransom payment of approximately \$40,000 for Daniel Walsh, run runner, two years ago. They also were investigating the possibility that the gang figured in the \$427,000 Brooklyn, N.Y., armored truck robbery.

Information furnished by Willard Hall, a landscape gardener, caused state police to investigate a report that Judge Crater had been detained at the Warwick estate of Jarl Retlich, who is held here in default of a \$125,000 bail for conspiracy to rob the United States mails. A considerable portion of the Fall River loot and an arsenal of machine guns and other weapons have been found at the Retlich villa.

## INDIFFERENT TONE ON N.Y. MARKET

NEW YORK, May 1—Indifferent is the best word to describe the performance of stocks in today's session. Aside from a few specialties the general list was mildly reactionary.

Turnover in the stock exchange was 820,960 shares, and the Associated Press average for 80 stocks was off .1 of a point at 39.3. The utilities gave a shade better performance than the general average, but even here the gains were mostly of minor character.

Bonds were a little better than stocks, except the rails, where the previous day's mild recession continued. The U. S. government obligations were again higher, and further new peaks were established by several issues, before modest declines at the close shaded earlier improvement.

Silver shares were again reactionary as the New York price of the white metal declined 3/4 of a cent an ounce at 75 cents. The U. S. treasury failed to make any change
