BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE IN TRYON

The smoking ruins of a large barn were yesterday viewed by many passers by and the comments on the origin if they can be substantiated go to show that there is here an opportunity for the Attorney-General to exert his authority. Within the past three weeks and within a radius of three quarters of a mile, three barns have been burned to the ground, and in each case the origin of the fire is unknown. This time the large, commodious, and well-equipped barn belonging to Angus Macdonald, North Tryon has been razed to the ground. Wednesday night, about nine-thirty, W. H. Hood, whose property is just across the road from Mr Macdonald's, noticed flames through the windows of the burning barn. Some neighbors were summoned but on their arrival at the scene the fire was in such an advanced stage that nothing could be done to save the building or its contents. The smaller barn adjoining the one burned was saved with great difficulty. One horse, five milk cows, one bull, were burned. Two horses and three cows were saved. Two of the cows managed in some way to escape from the building but when they got outside they were so badly burned that one had to be killed while the other is not expected to survive. All the crop, including hay and grain was destroyed. The building was equipped in an up-to-date manner, having a grain crusher, operated by wind-mill power, installed. A splendid water system was also fitted up and in operation. The building was worth \$2,500 and was insured for only \$800.
