### GERMAN PRESS HAS WORDS FOR DEWEY

His Recent Interview as Published in the U. S. Press

Admiral Dewey's Remarks Reflecting on the Kaiser's Navy Causes Considerable Ill-Feeling.

BERLIN, March 29.—The German Foreign Office officials say they do not believe that a diplomatic incident will result from the recent interview with Admiral Dewey (published in a newspaper of Newark, N. J., and containing references to the German navy and German Emperor.)

The officials say they are reluctant to believe that the admiral was correctly quoted, "especially in view of the goodwill he showed towards Germany in the messages exchanged with Prince Henry." The Foreign Office officials add that should the interview be true, it "would prove somewhat disturbing to the peaceful relations with the United States." No official information on the subject has been received from Washington.

The interview with Admiral Dewey has angered the newspapers here. Even those of usually moderate tone refer to it in a bitter manner. For instance, The Vossische Zeitung says:

The American navy evidently is suffering from a disease of infamy—lack of modesty. Its leader evinces something unacceptably immature. One can only stand amazed that such intensified self-complacency should take root in a people of German's origin. Such behavior would excite wonder if it had occurred in some Central or South American republic or in Hayti. Admiral Dewey is a worthy imitator of Captain (now Rear Admiral) Coghlan, who as a New York club, gave a boastful toast still glibly with insults to Germany, and warned up the exploded story that Admiral Dewey compelled the German fleet, at Manila, to lay to when it refused to respect the blockade. Captain Coghlan, however, to have spoken from Admiral Dewey's own heart. Captain Coghlan was disciplined, and President McKinley expressed to the German Ambassador his regret that the incident occurred. The same thing must, perhaps, be done now, in order that super-heated Deweys may be cooled down. Political generals and admirals, at any rate, are not a sign of wholesome political condition.

The Tagblatt sees in Admiral Dewey's quoted words confirmation of "the official repeated assertion that the United States' easy victory over Spain has produced a certain exaggerated military self-esteem."

### SIR HECTOR'S SUICIDE.

The London comment on the causes. Inquiry to be made in Parliament why telegram was sent.

MONTREAL, March 31.—A special London cable to the Herald says: "A high official tells me that General Hector Macdonald was accused of taking advantage of one of the ladies at the governor's home in Ceylon. There is no suggestion of any other offence. It is certain that Governor Ridgeway sent a despatch to London unnecessarily reflecting on General Macdonald. Though private as any other official document, the despatch was published. Major Lash is to ask for the reason of the publication to-day in the House of Commons."

"It is the general opinion that Lady Macdonald deserves no sympathy, for her obstinacy was largely responsible for the dog-like funeral of General Macdonald. He saw her only once during the past decade, but loyally supported her and their son. The war office offered a gun carriage for services at the funeral and General Hunter, a comrade of Macdonald in Egypt, wanted to attend the funeral in uniform accompanied by his staff, but Lady Macdonald refused both offers. She has avenged her wounded womanhood on the corpse of the general."
