MONTREAL, March 23.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was again extremely dull and sales were confined to odd lots for near-by shipment. The car lots business in each grain was also quiet the demand being of a very limited character. Prices were well maintained for all grades of oats while there was a somewhat better feeling in the domestic market for spring wheat grades of flour with no change in prices. The winter wheat flour market was quiet and steady. Prices for all grades of milled were well maintained under a fair demand. The movement of standard grades of rolled oats continued steady and prices were unchanged. A strong feeling prevailed in the egg market but prices failed to show any change. A large volume of business was transacted. A weaker feeling developed in the potato market and prices sag. There was no change in the condition of the market for beans, prices being steady with a small trade passing in choice handpicked white grades at \$2.40 to \$2.45, per bushel and smaller quantities \$2 to \$2.50 per bushel. The butter and cheese market were moderately active and prices were firm.
