Eggs brought 14 cents per dozen and butter from 18 to 20 cents per lb. There is no sale for potatoes in the wholesale trade, the price remaining about 20 cents per bus. Onions, black brought 37 and white 36 cts per bus.

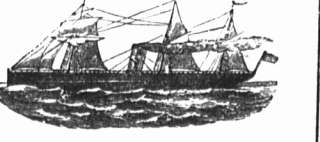
