HELENA ON LONG TRIP.—The government tug, Helena will leave shortly for Quebec with two steel scows which are to be repaired at a St. Lawrence port, and the towboat will bring back two steel scows to replace the carriers taken away, says a St. John exchange. Two large scows for use at Charlottetown (P. E. I.) will be shipped from St. John on the Helena's tow. She will be met at Halifax by a tug which will assist in the long voyage. The tug Nereid has been chartered by the government to replace the Helena, temporarily, and was at work yesterday.

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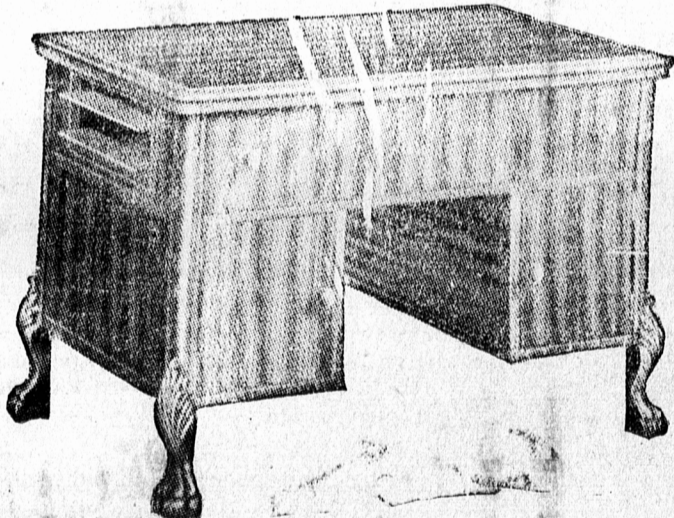

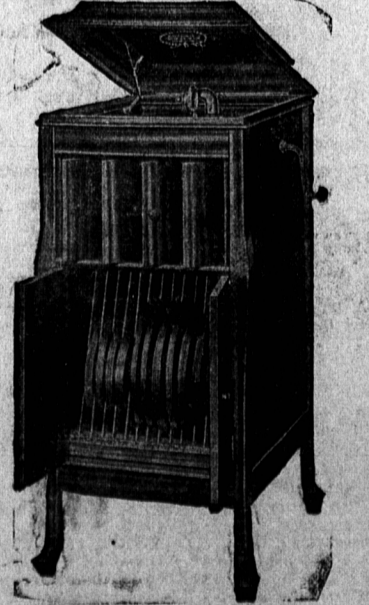
