LEGAL DRIVING AND LIGHTS

Upon commencing these articles, it would be perhaps a good plan to make mention of the proper logical and legal method of driving your car. Recently a number of accidents have occurred some of which might have been averted had the driver operated his car as the law defines. First, of course is reasonable care at moderate speed, control, and attention to what you are doing. Funny stunts are clever and humorous only to the driver and much of the levity fades when one is responsible for another's death, and most certainly there is no driving your car properly, having both yourself and your car in drivable condition.

Lawful driving compels you to protect the man on the right at all times. If every driver does this there can be no collisions.

If you are driving along a certain street and upon approaching an intersection you see a car coming toward you from the right, stop and let him pass. That is all. It is quite simple, but so much depends upon it.

If you wish to make a complete turn, make the turn at the next intersection. Do not make the complete turn between two streets. Extend your left arm if turning to the left, but do not cut corners when turning to the left. Use the horn discriminately. Be sure the horn is nothing behind your car when backing up.

Regarding lights. Be courteous to cars approaching at night. Avoid headlights of spotlights and dim your headlights if necessary. Keep a sharp lookout for teams. In other provinces every vehicle must display lights front and rear. This includes teams and even bicycles. Unfortunately it is not enforced in P. E. I., but if every team driver knew the chance he is taking by driving without lights, he would certainly protect himself.

It is often impossible to see a team until right upon it and it is phenomenal that more accidents do not occur. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

MEAT AND BONE BY PRODUCTS

Analyses of samples of meat and bone by-products including meat and blood meals, tankage, bone meal, and fish meals, have been made by the Chemistry Division of the Experimental Farms and the results detailed in bulletin No. 49 of the Department of Agriculture. The analyses show that these feeding-stuffs are highly nitrogenous concentrates and that they constitute a valuable source of protein and bone making material. The bulletin, which is distributed by the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, gives the details of the composition of a number of these materials at present on the market in Canada.
