CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Randolph says—London came considerably higher this morning and we opened at very general advances though fail- ing to reach the equivalent of the London quotations. Very heavy profit taking occurred on the rise as was only natural considering the ex- tent of the advance of the last few days and after the first hour the market began to show the weight of this selling. Shorts joined in and under this pressure from both ac- counts prices generally serged off, so that before the close less of three quarters of a point to one point were quite general throughout the active list as compared with the early high level. The market was less active on the decline, however, and the pressure was not severe, ap- parently being no more than expect- ed from the usual profit taking sales at the end of the week. Lehigh was conspicuously strong in the face of the decline elsewhere and this gave rise to the sales of Reading. The known movements of money course indicate a very favorable statement was expected. Europe seems to be favorably inclined towards our securities and will undoubtedly sub- scribe heavily to the new New York City loan.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The statisti- cal position of cotton as shown by the Chronicle this morning is very interesting. In the matter of world's visible supply we have this week's fig- ures which show an excess of 408,000 bales over the same last year. In the matter of the amount of the American visible supply, we have an increase of 434,000 bales, in the mat- ter of the crop intosight we have an excess over last year of 1,129,000 bales. In the intosight figures for the week we have an excess of 70,000 bales over last year. Port receipts show 70,000 bales increase over those of last year. The exports for the week show an increase of 183,000 over same week last year. The exports for season show 906,000 bales in ex- cess of last year. The belief in a twelve million bales crop has now become very general and the world at large seems to accept these fig- ures. The supply of cotton in New York City is very large. As against 163,000 bales of stock last year there are in the warehouses in New York City today 87,000 bales. But the cot- ton is firm and undoubtedly the two or three large operators who are identified with last year's cam- paign (out of which some money was made) are strongly fortified. This may account for the deadlocked posi- tion of the market which has fluctu- ated this morning within very narrow limits. The situation in the matter of prices depends after all upon the consumption of cotton and to this the prices of futures as well as spots must in time respond.

The reports from Liverpool show that Lancashire and the rest of Eng- land is still engaged in a business which shows a great and continued demand for cotton goods from China and the east. In America the trade is not good and on the continent while it shows some improvement it in no way compares with the active trade in England. The deadlocked condi- tion of our market would seem to justify the assumption that the con- ditions have been thoroughly dis- counted and the price of cotton re- maining steadily as it does around 15 cents. May represents in the light of the demand at this time what would seem to be a firm price for the staple. My feeling is that in time it will be demonstrated that the supply is in excess of the de- mand and that the market will gra- dually decline from these levels. A comparison of prices which exist at present with those at a similar pe- riod last year has little value as cause today is the anniversary of the big drop of last year's market. May futures on the thirteenth of Janu- ary, were fifteen cents. On the fourteenth of this month they sold as low as 13.80. In March, however, last year they sold again at 15 cents. It would seem, however, that after the readjustment in prices last year with a crop of 10,500,000 and with European trade very much cur- tailed, cotton was selling at same prices as at present time.
