Inhuman Treatment By Father CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 11.—A 22-year-old youth who said he had been kept a virtual prisoner by his father in the cellar of his home for 30 months was found and released by the Cincinnati police. The youth, Arthur Doebrich, was found huddled on a coal pile, his clothing in rags, his beard grown long and his hair matted and unkempt, dropping to his shoulders. Police immediately began a search for the father, Adolph Doebrich, a tile fitter. The boy told detectives that his father had developed a deep hatred against himself, his mother and an elder sister, and kept them in a constant state of terror by his threats. Arthur's plight was made known to police by neighbors of the family who had become suspicious about his disappearance. Other members of the Doebrich family, it was understood, had told the neighbors that the boy was in the cellar. Physicians at the General Hospital, where Arthur was taken, said he apparently had been fed fairly well and that he talked rationally. Neighbors who knew the youth before he dropped out of sight said he was a talented pianist, a high school graduate and that he had a keen interest in electrical experiments. His father, the neighbors said, explained Arthur's disappearance by saying he was in another city or, at times, saying he was ill in a hospital.

Civic Officials Await Word From Montreal May Open Ports To U.S. Vessels For Supplies (Canadian Press) CALGARY, Jan. 11.—Civic officials tonight were awaiting word from the head office of the Bank of Montreal at Montreal to definitely establish whether civic employees will be paid in full when pay day comes on Saturday. It was estimated about \$750,000 would be required, exclusive of salaries of school teachers. Disagreement between the city and the bank, according to Mayor Andy Davison, is delaying establishment of a definite line of credit to assure civic operations.
