Futurity Material

The eight futurities which mature in 1926 will have larger fields than were seen in the three year old events last year but it is very doubtful if they will bring to the post a speed marvel that will shade the record made by Mr. McElwain.

The returns for 1925 show that the crop of two year olds was a very even lot with the exception of Peter Maltby. He won wherever he took the word. All of them chased him from Endicott to Lexington but none of them were close enough at the finish to make Dickerson shake him up.

Station Belle, Hollywood Susan and Hazleton were the closest. The first two finished second to him at Columbus, one in 2:06 1-4 and the other in 2:07 1-4, while at Lexington Hazleton was placed in both heats in 2:06 3-4 and 2:07 in the Junior Division of the Kentucky Futurity. Those who saw the race were also satisfied that Cox was the most surprised party on the race track when the Lu Prince colt made such a good showing.

The Columbus heat was placed, Station Belle, Petrona Harvester and Josephine Volo being between him and the winner.

Peter Maltby is in all of the three year old stakes which will be trotted over the mile tracks except the Hambletonian. If he does not meet with any mishaps he is also the target at which all will be compelled to shoot except when they turn for the word at Syracuse.

The other three year olds which on public form are entitled to close include Hollywood Susan, Sam Williams, Charm, Station Belle, Guy Dean, Polly Peachtree, Double Cross, Bright Dawn, Peter Hayes, Tom Bradley, Petrona Harvester, Tipple Volo, Miss Ettie and Peter Stamford. To this can be added the youngsters which have not as yet taken the word or shown enough in the races in which they started to rate them as dangerous.

The latter must never be lost sight of as was shown by the sweep made by The Harvester in 1908 and Mary Putney in 1915, neither of which took the word as two year olds, or the tremendous improvement made by Guy Ozark last year when after being an indifferent two year old he showed that he could trot in 2:03 last year.

At the beginning of 1925 it looked as if Alton Sumatra and Sam Williams were the best three year olds. Sumatra went lame at Toledo. The other two divided all of the events on the mile tracks. This year except in the Hambletonian Stako it will be up to the riders to watch Peter Maltby. His mark is 2:06 1-4. It remains to be seen whether he can duplicate the 2:02 made by Mr. McElwain when he defeated Guy Richard or if any of the present crop of three year olds can race fast enough to make him go that fast to win.

The present crop of two year olds, Hollywood Susan, Hazleton, Charm and Station Belle his most formidable competitors. Of these Hollywood Susan has shown that she can race in any kind of footing as well as in the fastest company. At Syracuse when Peter Maltby won the deciding heat of the Wet Weather Track Stake over the cinder course she was second in 2:08 1-4. In the Breeders Futurity at Columbus she was again second to the Peter Volo colt in 2:07 while at Lexington she won the May Day Stake from Guy Dean, Polly Peachtree and Station Belle in 2:11 1-2 on a cold day in the mud.

Hazleton was one of the surprises of the year. This son of Lu Princeton and Joannette Speed did not attract much attention as a speed marvel until the stables arrived at Columbus in September. At that time he was rated up to 2:10 which was the point at which his stable companion Tom Bradley stepped. At Lexington he moved up to second in 2:06 3-4 and looked as if he could have done a little better if Walter Cox had hustled him along in the deciding heat. This race was followed by a victory at Atlanta in 2:10 1-2 over Double Cross, Station Belle and Tom Bradley.

Charm and Station Belle are in White's stable. Both of them won last year, Charm at Kalamazoo in 2:09 1-2 after which she was on the complaining list and Station Belle at Cleveland in the Rainy Day Stake, Hollywood Susan and the Volo. She also won a two year old fixture at Columbus during the Ohio State Fair and remained as a contender in all of the leading two year old events until the current fall on the Grand Circuit at Atlanta.

Guy Dean as his name implies is by Guy Axworthy out of Jenny Dean 2:09 1-4 by Prince Ingomar. He races in the Montour Farm colors which were carried to victory so frequently in 1909 by Mignola 2:04 1-4. In his two year old form Guy Dean managed to get in the money events at Milwaukee and Indianapolis, while at Lexington he finished third to Peter Maltby and second to Hollywood Susan when she won the May Day Stake. He is a high class colt and will be given a very careful preparation for his engagements this year.

Polly Peachtree and Lucy Lullwater, a sister to The Senator 2:03 1-4, are apt to be the leading three year olds in the Lullwater Farm stakes. Polly Peachtree made a number of starts last year. During the August meeting at Cleveland she won at three quarters of a mile from Guy Stewart, Hazleton and Miss Ettie while at Milwaukee she finished second in one heat in 2:07 1-4 to Peter Maltby. She also divided third and fourth money with Station Belle in the May Day Stake at Lexington and might have been nearer the top of the summary if she had not met with a mishap after setting the word in the second heat.

Double Cross made her best showing when she won a preliminary heat in the Rainy Day Stake at Cleveland in 2:08 3-4. She also landed in the Consolation over the last season, Royal Guy, a brother cinder track at Syracuse and was brother to Trumpet, Angeline Ax-

worthy, and Yuma by Guy Axworthy out of Volga 2:04 1-2. All of them have shown sufficient speed to warrant their owners carrying them along to a point at which the final starting fee will leave them eligible to take the word.
