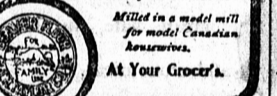

WHERE KING EDWARD'S RACEHORSES ARE TRAINED.

A Visit to Egerton House, Newmarket, Where "Dick" Marsh Puts the Royal Thoroughbreds into Shape.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Several of the largest and most famous horse-training establishments have been visited by the present writer, but none which he has found more curiously interesting than at Egerton House, Newmarket, where the celebrated Richard Marsh, one of the most popular trainers of race-horses of the time, is the presiding genius. "Dick" Marsh, as he is generally known on the turf, has had the confidence of many of the most distinguished owners in his time, and he enjoys the greatest of all favors in that he is the man to whom is entrusted the task of winning up to complete pitch the thoroughbreds of His Majesty King Edward when important engagements are pending. The King has bestowed many marks of favor on the trainer of Diamond Jubilee and other heroes of the turf, notably when he personally decorated him with the Coronation medal.

Mr. Marsh's establishment is about two miles from Newmarket, and is almost a little village in itself, for the staff is large and it is necessary, in the interests of the horses and their owners, that everybody should live entirely on the premises. Just outside the stables is Mr. Marsh's office, on the walls of which are hung the light racing shoes or plates which were worn by some of the greatest horses that have ever been turned out of the stables, among them being those of Diamond Jubilee, Persimmon, and Jaddah.

In glass cases round the walls are the racing jackets of various distinguished owners whose horses are trained here, including the purple and gold of the King. In the vestibule of the main arch leading to the stables are the plates of all the horses that have sojourned at Egerton House and won a race whilst doing so. The exact nature of the victory and the amount of the stake won are painted in the centre, and thus the brilliant are distinguished from the average and the average from the bad. These are, as it were, the records of the "old boys" of Egerton House, and no horse is anything but an embryo racer until his plate goes up.

The stables are built most elaborately, the architecture being in the early Norman style with an imposing facade. They are ventilated in the most perfect manner and the lighting arrangements are admirably, electric lamps being fixed in every corner, in the stables are constantly located dozens of the guest race-horses of the time, worth collectively some hundreds of thousands of pounds.

TWO WIVES BUT NOT A BIGAMIST

James Farwell Had Not Seen First Wife for Years When He Married Again.

TORONTO, August 11.—A remarkable charge of bigamy was investigated in the police court to-day. James Farwell was accused of marrying Elizabeth Jane Nashwell, knowing that his first wife (nee Sarah Jane Martineau) was still alive. The first wife gave evidence that she was married to the prisoner in 1871, but the last time she saw her husband until she saw him in the dock yesterday was 23 or 24 years ago. He was then in the dock at the Michigan police court, and was sent to prison for three years, for shop-breaking. The prisoner went on the witness stand and gave his reason for marrying Miss Nashwell, that he had not seen or heard anything of his first wife for over twenty years. At the conclusion of the evidence Colonel Denison intimated that he would convict, whereupon J. M. Godfrey, the prisoner's counsel, contended that there could be no conviction, as where husband and wife had not seen or heard of each other or known of each other's existence for seven years, no charge of bigamy could be sustained. Colonel Denison, having read the law on the subject, discharged the prisoner.
